### MR. AND MRS. S. C. MILLER CELEBRATE GOLDEN WEDDING ANNIVERSARY, JANUARY 22

Mr. and Mrs. S. C. Miller, prominent residents of Douglas county for many years, celebrated their golden wedding anniversary Monday, January 22nd, quietly at their home at Dillard, where relatives and friends called during the day presenting lovely gifts and bouquets of flowers to the Millers in observance of the occasion. An account of Mr. Miller convalescing from a recent illness of pneumonia, the couple spent the day quietly at their home.

The previous day, Sunday, January 21st, Mr. and Mrs. Miller were guests of honor at the First Baptist church service, where a very beautiful bouquet of flowers was presented to them from the church members and pastor and Mr. Miller responded with a short talk thanking his friends for their kindness.

Mr. Miller, born July 24, 1857, is now eighty-two years of age. His birthplace was in Lane county, near Eugene. He was the son of the late Rev. and Mrs. W. G. Miller. Rev. Mr. Miller was pastor of the Roseburg First Baptist church at the time of its organization in this city. The greater part of Mr. Miller's life has been spent engaged in the stock business and operating his extensive ranch properties in the Dillard and Fort Klamath communities with the exception of serving as deputy sheriff of Douglas county from 1886-90 and as sheriff of this county from 1890 to 94. He has two sisters living, Mrs. Nettie Noah, of Dillard, and Mrs. Mary Sweet, of Ashland.

Mrs. Miller was born November 17th, 1865, at Dillard, Ore. to Mr. and Mrs. James Dillard, pioneer Douglas county residents, and has spent her entire life here. She has one sister, Mrs. W. L. Cobb, of Roseburg.

Mr. and Mrs. Miller were married in Dillard January 22, 1890, by the late Rev. J. R. N. Bell, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Roseburg. To this union were born two sons and two daughters, Loren L. Miller and Mrs. Ruth Miller Blair, of Dillard, and Ethel and Floyd Miller, deceased. They have five grandchildren: Douglas and Richard Blair, sons of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Blair; and Loren, Jr., Patricia and Sammy, children of Mr. and Mrs. Loren L. Miller.

During the anniversary day, an formal letter arrived at the Miller home from Mr. Miller's nephew, Fred Chandler, of Pasadena, Calif., who attended the wedding in Roseburg fifty years ago.
