

Italian, Hungarian Units to Aid Finns

BERNE, Switzerland, Jan. 26.—(AP)—More than 2,000 trained Italian and Hungarian volunteers to aid the Finns in their fight against Soviet Russia were reported today by reliable sources in Berne to have crossed through France recently en route to Finland by way of the North sea.

They said the French and the Scandinavian nations had guaranteed free transit for the group under the resolution of the league of nations assembly to lend all help possible to the Finns.

This was the second body of Italians going to Finland but the first group to include Hungarians. The informants said.

The Italians in the latest group were said to be in part technicians but mostly infantrymen who saw service with the Black Arrow division in the Spanish civil war.

The 2,000 were said to have traveled as a battalion with auxiliary units into France to be transported by sea to Norway and thence overland through Sweden to Finland.

U. S. DETERMINED JAPAN MUST RESPECT RIGHTS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.—(AP)—Respect for American rights is the price which Japan must pay, officials here say, if she wants a new treaty guaranteeing her trade against discriminatory treatment by the United States.

The Japanese-American commercial treaty of 1911, which pledged both countries not to discriminate against trade of the other, expired last midnight.

It had been abrogated by Secretary Hull last July, following repeated interference by the Japanese with American interests in China.

Embargo Path Open

Expiration of the pact leaves President Roosevelt free to raise duties on Japanese imports, if he finds that Japan is discriminating against the United States; to impose a complete embargo on Japanese imports if the discrimination then continues, and to impose special harbor charges or tonnage rates on Japanese vessels.

The termination of the treaty leaves congress free also to authorize additional action against the Tokyo government, such as the embargo proposed by Senator Pittman (D., Nev.) and Schwelb, (D., Wash.) against the shipment to Japan of raw materials useful in the conduct of hostilities against the Chinese.

United States officials are inclined, however, to "sit tight" for the time being and let Japan make the first move.

Churchill Orates

A German communiqué said the German sea war had resulted in the sinking of more than 20,000 tons of shipping on Thursday and that in addition two steamers had been picked off by a German submarine off Oporto even though they were being convoyed. The British immediately denied the latter.

Winston Churchill, Britain's first lord of the admiralty, carried on the war of words with a speech in Manchester in which he contended "the imperial Germany of 1914 was a stronger enemy than the Nazi Germany of today."

Churchill said he had no idea what the war would cost but he believed that France and England in money and man power "can and will outlast the enemy."

Radio Ban Hits Nazis

The Berlin radio issued a stern warning last night, reminding Germans of the ban against listening to foreign broadcasts and citing cases of violators sentenced to long jail terms.

The speaker emphasized that alien nationals residing in the Reich must also obey the law which provides capital punishment in aggravated cases. Musical, as well as news broadcasts, even from neutral countries, are banned.

Japan received the British answer to her protest against last Saturday's seizure of 21 German seamen from a Japanese steamer—and the foreign office promptly indicated it was unsatisfactory.

The lower house of the Union of South Africa's parliament defeated 81-59 a resolution by former Prime Minister General J. B. M. Hertzog calling for restoration of peace between Germany and the union.

BERLIN, Jan. 27.—(AP)—German artillery silenced loudspeakers in the French lines at Alenchoin on the western front, DNB, official German news agency, said today, because derogatory remarks about Adolf Hitler were broadcast.

DNB said the Germans first warned the French to stop the broadcasts; then fired.

PARIS, Jan. 27.—(AP)—French shipping circles today reported the 276-ton French freighter Tonny had been torpedoed in the Atlantic ocean off the coast of Spain by a German submarine.

The Tonny was on route from the French African colony of Senegal to a Spanish port.

Bill Proves War Vets' Cemetery at Portland

WASHINGTON, Jan. 27.—(AP)—Senators McNary and Holman and Representative Mott, Oregon republicans, introduced in congress this week a bill to establish a war veterans national cemetery at Portland.

Under a law enacted in 1938 the secretary of war has authority to establish such a burial place for veterans in each state if land is donated.

The bill would authorize the secretary to acquire the site by condemnation, purchase, donation or otherwise. It appropriates whatever sum is needed to carry out the purposes of the act.

Enlistments For Alien War Taboo

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26.—(AP)—President Roosevelt said today no foreign nation legally could maintain an enlistment service in this country and no American enlisting in a foreign armed service would lose his citizenship unless he took an oath of allegiance to a foreign government.

The question of enlistments was raised at a press conference by reporters who were informed by the chief executive that they were several months late in asking it.

He had in his desk an informal opinion from the attorney general dated last September 5, which he said made it clear solicitation of enlistments in this country was banned and Americans would be expropriated if they enlisted in the cause of any of the belligerent nations and swore away their allegiance to the United States.

A reporter said he recently had visited the Finnish legation here and noticed an American aviator offering to enlist in the service of Finland.

The president said he would have to have more facts before he could determine whether such an incident might represent operation of an enlistment service.

If the American merely was asking for information on where he might enlist, the chief executive asserted, there was nothing wrong. But if the legation was inviting Americans to enlist, it was a different story.

To a question of whether Finland was classed as a belligerent country, Mr. Roosevelt responded in the negative and said that raised another question which he had not yet got around to. He did not amplify.
