Sawmill-Lumber Council Will Ask 30-Hour Week

LEWISTON, Ida., Jan. 29.—(AP)—A resolution favoring a 30-hour week for all lumber firms in the Pacific northwest will be adopted at the semi-annual conference of the Inland Empire Council of Lumber and Sawmill Workers unions (AFL) yesterday.

Most of the industry now works on a 40-hour week schedule.

The resolution was adopted after Doyle Pearson, Everett, Wash., member of the B-State council executive board, told the delegates that climbing lumber prices indicate the ability of employers to make the reduction in hours without cutting wages.

The proposal will be presented to the Oregon-Washington council executive board at its meeting in Portland next week-end.
