

Big Crowd Assured For Benefit Ball

Advances ticket sales assure a large crowd of dancers at the annual President's Birthday ball to be held at the Roseburg armory tonight as a part of the nationwide campaign against infantile paralysis. A. B. (Skip) Cacy, chairman, reported today. An unusually large response has been assured to the advance sale of tickets, he states, and there is every indication that the local event will be entirely successful.

Music for dancing is to be provided by a specially arranged 8-piece orchestra, which is donating its services.

One-half of the proceeds from tonight's event will be retained in the local fund for use in aiding local victims of infantile paralysis, while the balance will be forwarded to national headquarters to be used in research activities.

German Planes Again Raid British Shipping

pursuit continued. Fighters were in action against other German planes over several east coast towns.

In addition to a continuation of the war on shipping—it was estimated that from 15 to 20 German planes took part yesterday—German planes flew over British coast towns.

Two German planes flew low over the northeast coast of Scotland while a third craft twice circled a Kentish coast town, in southeast England, at a height of less than 100 feet.

Confronted with a possibly ominous stepping-up of German air raids, Britons wondered if a lightning war against shipping might not be at hand.

Lightship Bombed

John Saunders of Varnouth, sole survivor of the crew of a coastal lightship machine-gunned by a German plane yesterday struggled ashore at an east coast town today as the bodies of his seven shipmates were found on the beach near a wrecked dinghy.

The bomber, he said, sprayed the lightship with bullets and dropped nine bombs, one of which struck the craft.

Loss of the crew of 20 aboard the 3,000-ton Danish steamer Freshborg, when it struck a mine off the coast of Scotland was announced today.

BURBANK, Calif., Jan. 30.—(AP)—Great Britain has contracted with Lockheed Aircraft Corp. for 200 new type bombing planes, bringing to 750 its purchases of sky warriors from the firm in recent months.

The company announced yesterday that the bombers are faster and larger than the Hudson type used previously. The contract, including spare parts, aggregates \$18,000,000. The ships will be produced at the rate of 40 per month.

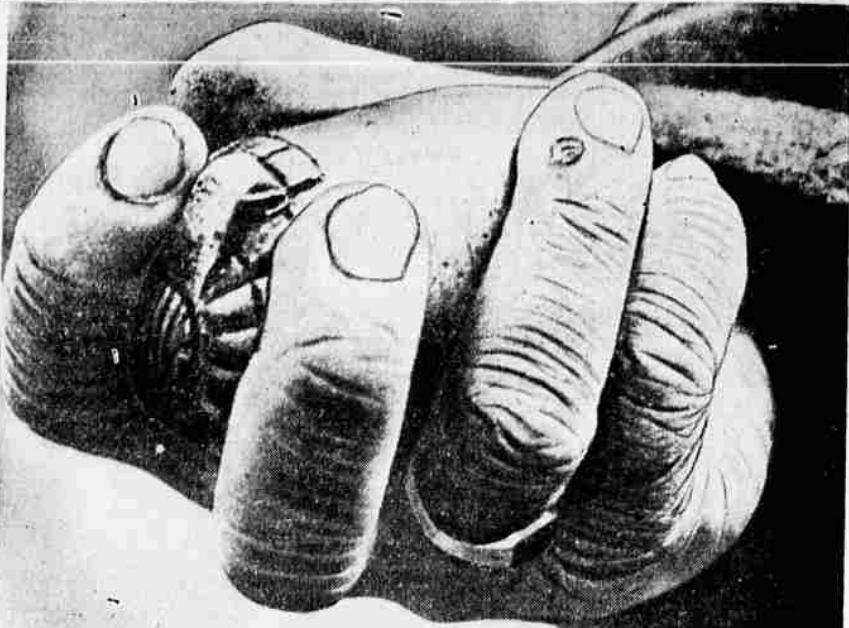

which was to have accomplished improvements," he said. "It was a treaty of innumerable clauses, all of which accomplished just nothing."

For a long time Germany "begged and entreated" her western neighbors for justice, he said. "But after all, these entreaties proved themselves to be in vain. Then, and then only, did national socialism originate."

What happened, he said, was that the allies "soon set about chopping Europe into small pieces." "A crazy system of reparations was invented and no people experienced the results more than the Germans," Hitler said, drawing his now-familiar picture of a post-war Germany boyed under by the Versailles treaty.

Sarcasm Voiced

"We hear much today about democratic ideals," England has waged most of the wars of this world... a new Europe is supposed to arise and there should be general disarmament, and this disarmament is then supposed to begin the economic prosperity of Europe, especially free trade.

"Under this free trade civilization is to flourish," he went on, still apparently referring sarcastically to Britain's stated "peace objectives."

"In one word," he said sardonically, "the golden age is to begin several times."

"All this was promised in 1918—the new justice and so forth. Already at that time there was a program of disarmament.

There were great jeering roars as he said this.

"It was expected that as a result of that disarmament in 1919 there would be universal prosperity."

"And this treaty of Versailles (after the world war) was supported by the league of nations—which was not a league of free nations. But they tried to force us to live up to the dictates of the treaty."

"This democratic Germany (of the post war period) was the product of the allies—and how they have maltreated it!"

"Those were years of economic disintegration and enslavement."

"In all these years Germany hoped and begged and protested in vain. But they (allies) thought there were too many millions of Germans in this world. They were unconcerned about the sufferings

returned from the Lake Ladoga front. He said that nurses and doctors remained aboard the train, reassuring their several hundred patients.

The bombs missed the train, the doctor said, but some cars were struck by machine gun bullets.

RAIDS COST RUSSIANS 21 PLANES, FINLAND REPORTS

HELSINKI, Jan. 30.—(AP)—The Finnish high command announced today Finnish planes and anti-aircraft batteries downed 21 Russian planes during yesterday's widespread raids over southern Finland.

It was declared that Finnish planes had bombed "a certain harbor and vessels lying there"—and informed circles here assumed that this meant the Russian naval base of Kronstadt near Leningrad.

The Finnish command said only one Finnish plane was lost. (The Russian high command insisted, however, that seven Finnish planes had been downed yesterday.)

A high command communique, describing increased sea and land fighting as well as air activity, estimated 200 Russian planes took part in the raids in which "over 30 civilians were killed and about 50 houses were destroyed."

It was estimated 800 bombs were rained on 33 cities and towns.

Russians Lose Heavily

The Finns said their air force struck at Russia by bombing "enemy motor lorry columns, troop quarters and certain railway stations."

Northeast of Lake Ladoga, which Finnish-Russian fighting has been particularly intense for the past week, the Finns declared the Russians had attempted a few attacks but were repulsed with "heavy casualties."

Supporting this action, naval forces attacked the Finnish fort at Mantso, on a Lake Ladoga island flanking the northeast front. The Finns said this blow was fended off.

The Mantso attack was believed to have been an effort to cover reinforcements being brought to the northeast front to assist badly battered soviet divisions.

Unofficial reports averred that soviet leaders were attempting to reorganize the Lake Ladoga offensive.

Finns believe Russia's massed aerial assault on their nation to be soviet strategy intended to minimize the effect of red land reverses.

must rescue the small farmer and the small employer from the dominating federal bureaucracy."

Martin said taxes on consumers had risen from 22 per cent of the national revenue to 60 per cent in ten years and called for a "house-and-buggy" solution — "common sense economy in the administration of public business."

Landon Adds Rap

Landon told Kansas republicans "future historians will characterize the new deal as the butterfingers administration in the nation's history."

"What President Roosevelt forsook," exclaimed the former Kansas governor, "is that all of his policies and utterances affect the

prosperity of the United States.

"If there was any merit in the president's pump priming program, he destroyed it by his bagging of business."

Mr. Roosevelt's 1936 foe said he believed the administration would not seek to raise the debt limit this year but instead would borrow billions of dollars from government corporations for a spending program.

"But the people no longer will be mesmerized by the golden voice in the white house," he asserted. "No longer will the fire-side chats cover up seven years of failure to find work for nine millions of people."

Hamilton in an address before the republican state committee said "if we have four more years of new dealism the republican form of government cannot survive."
