

### Indians to Battle North Bend Quint

#### R. H. S. Warriors Thirst For Revenge Upon Team That Wrecked Hopes in 1937.

The Roseburg high school team set goes back into district No. 8 competition tomorrow evening when they meet North Bend high school on the senior high court. This will be the first game of the season between these two schools, the original date of January 5, having been cancelled because of the epidemic which laid low the majority of the Bulldogs squad. The Indians will replay the contest on February 17.

When the Bulldogs and the Indians square off tomorrow night, it will be the first engagement since North Bend knocked Roseburg out of the running in the district tournament last March. The Indians are welcoming this opportunity to wreak revenge for that heart-breaking loss and are determined to post a victory.

North Bend is without the services of Marion "Duke" Spack, stellar guard who was the backbone of the visitors' defense and attack last year. Notwithstanding, they again come up with a strong combination which recently blasted Marshfield high school out of a tie for the league leadership.

With the return of Royal Denton, huge center, to the Indian lineup, the local warriors should be materially strengthened for the balance of the season. However, for the Bulldogs game at least, the strength gained by the return of Denton will be partially offset by the loss of Ray Pickett, regular forward because of inactivity.
