LAKELAND, Fla., Jan. 31.—(AP)—The Florida citrus commission today placed a "day" embargo, effective at 6 p. m., tomorrow, on marketing of oranges, grapefruit and tangerines to keep frozen fruit off the counters and the tables of the country.

The embargo will apply to fresh fruit only and will not affect canned products.
