U. S. Has Japs Cold,
Financier Says

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 31.—(AP)—A British financier from Shanghai said today that America "is playing poker in Japan with five deuces," and that "you've got the Japanese absolutely cold, and all the business people in Japan know it."

The financier, Sir Victor Sassoon, arrived on the liner President Coolidge, from the Orient.

In Japan, he said, "the business people and diplomats want peace in China, and friendliness with the United States. They say it is our only hope."

"But there are other forces to be reckoned with. The navy favors peace, but figures if it can run a bluff and get something for nothing, why not try it. However, the navy is not looking for trouble."

"It is the army, sitting in the middle of Manchuria, that wants to fight America, while the navy which would have to do the fighting, does not."

China, he said, is too big to be conquered, and if the Chinese obstinately persist in refusing to be conquered, "there are not enough Japanese to subdue them."

Alaska Highway
Route Selected

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—(AP)—Representative Magnuson (D., Wash.), chairman of the Alaska International Highway commission, announced today the commission had recommended to the British Columbia-Yukon-Alaska highway commission of Canada selection of a route from Prince George to the Athabasca section of Alaska.

He said this route, known as the middle route, would tap the interior of Alaska panhandle and be preferable to the eastern route going farther north through Dawson.

The action was taken, Magnuson said, at a joint meeting of the commissions in Ottawa last week. He said the Canadian commission had no preference for either of three routes proposed and agreed to submit to its government the recommendation of the American commission.

The chairman said a coast route had been discarded because of bad shore conditions.

Magnuson said reports would be made to congress and the next step would be for this government to notify Canada it was ready to proceed and work out financial details if the highway were approved. The representative said the road would cost approximately \$25,000,000.
