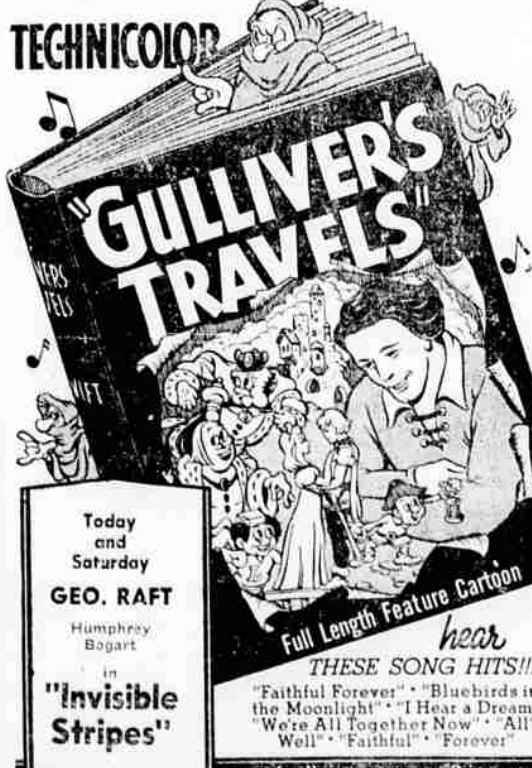

MARKET REPORTS

BOSTON, Feb. 2.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow:

"The wool market has passed through an exceedingly quiet week. Very little wool has been sold, except some pulled medium quality scoured and a little foreign wool. Quotations are difficult to make but efforts to sell wool indicate that class III fine territory wools are hardly quotable above the 90 cent mark, clean basis, although a hurried buyer might have to pay slightly more. Other descriptions are in relation to this level.

"A little more medium cross-bred South American has been sold to Canada at slight increase in rates, super 50s costing 33 to 33 1/2 cents in bond.

"Foreign markets are stronger. British control buyers having deliberately marked up prices on the best wools at the Cape about 4 pence a pound, clean basis, evident-
