PROBLEMS OF KEEPING AMERICA SECURE

Problems of keeping America secure were discussed by cabinet members, senators, representatives, army and navy officers and leaders of patriotic organizations, Secretary of War Woodring spoke Thursday evening, his message being broadcast. After receiving this latest and most authentic information on national defense, the conference adopted resolutions voicing the attitude of the delegates. Mrs. Lowell Fletcher Hobart, of Cincinnati, Ohio, first national president of the American Legion auxiliary and now president of the National Society of New England Women, presided with Mrs. William Corwith, of Rockville Centre, New York, as vice chairman. Both women gave a radio preview stressing the point that women are concerned about protection from cinas within and protection without. An adequate navy was considered necessary as the first line of defense. They felt that the series of resolutions passed would show the legislative bodies and the executive head of our government the concern of all thinking women. They pointed out the dangers of propaganda preaching subversive doctrines. Not war, but adequate defense to discourage war was their policy.
