Nazi Barbarity in Poland Publicized

PARIS, Feb. 2.—(AP)—The Polish government in exile is piecing together a story of atrocities in the German-occupied portion of Poland which it says rival or surpasses the most barbarous treatment of a conquered people in history.

In its series of "white papers," which are being issued periodically and are to be assembled in a book later, the Polish government describes the land that Germany seized as one of hunger, stark fear, wrecked churches and hospitals, and executions. It says deportations of the populace are conducted with methodical brutality.

A similar paper was issued last night by the Polish envoys to Italy and the Vatican.

Tales of atrocities and suffering also are reported from that portion of Poland which fell to Soviet Russia, but the papers deal mostly with the part held by Germany.

The Poles declare the papers contain only information which has been carefully investigated and verified, including an estimate that the Germans have executed 18,000 Poles of all classes.

At Bydgoszcz alone, the papers say, 6,000 persons had been shot down by the close of 1939, three months after Germany conquered the country.

As an example, one paper says the Bydgoszcz mayor, a Mr. Barczewski, "was ordered to clean the automobile of the gendarme (German secret police) with his tongue. He protested and was brutally beaten up and later shot to death."

State Superintendent of California Banks Dies

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 2.—(AP)—E. W. Wilson, state superintendent of banks, died today in Stanford University hospital here. He was about 70. He was appointed by Governor Culbert L. Olson in January 1939.

Postal Fund Embezzler Draws Year in Prison

PORTLAND, Feb. 2.—(AP)—Donald H. Curry, charged with embezzling \$543 in postal funds, was sentenced yesterday to a year in federal prison by Judge James A. Fee.

Curry, who pleaded guilty January 25, formerly operated a postal substitution in a jewelry store here.

State Treasurer Not to Run Again

PORTLAND, Feb. 1.—(AP)—State Treasurer Walter E. Pearson announced today he would not seek office at either the primary or general elections.

Pearson, appointed state treasurer upon election of his predecessor, Rufus Holman, to the United States senate, said demands of private business and the desire of his associates in the Bates, Lively and Pearson insurance company dictated his decision.

Pearson was appointed by former Governor Charles Martin before the inauguration of Governor Seaguo.

"The treasurer explained he accepted the appointment with a tentative understanding with his business associates that he would serve out Holman's term and then return to his office here."

"The prospective withdrawal from political office, Pearson added, was made considerably in advance of the primary to clear the field of uncertainty."

Pearson, a democrat, will serve only until the commencement of the new term in January 1941, and will not seek any other office."

Miners to Renew Demand For 30-Hour Work Week

COLUMBUS, O., Feb. 2.—(AP)—United Mine Workers delegates, concluding their 26th convention with an acclamation of support for the union's international officers, today carried to 600,000 members John L. Lewis' message that "we are only as strong as they (the members) make us, and only as they stand behind us."

In their final session, the 2,000 delegates empowered a committee to prepare wage scales for submission to coal operators in March, 1941; instructed the committee to seek written agreements with all operators of "captive" mines, and renewed a demand for a 30-hour work week to replace the present 35-hour week.

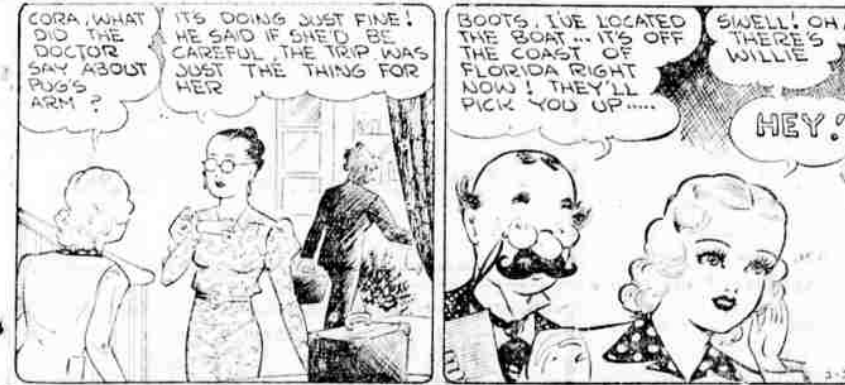
