## J. H. Stover, Civil War Veteran, Passes On at 92

He was born April 7, 1847, in Illinois, and served in the Civil war as a private in company C, 123rd Illinois Infantry. He is survived by a daughter, Mrs. W. J. Hammond, of Eastside. The body has been removed to the Douglas Funeral home and will later be taken to Marshfield, where funeral services will be held.

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## Gulliver Picture Proves Film Treat

Most everyone has heard or read Jonathan Swift's 200-year-old classic, "Gulliver's Travels," the exciting tale of an astounding journey by Lemuel Gulliver into the realm of Lilliput, but very few have ever heard the eyewitness account of just what happened as dramatically told by Gaby, the town crier, the funny little man who discovered the giant castaway on the beach.

Such is the screen version of Swift's satirical essay as is done by Max Fleischer in his first full-length, animated story of the shipwrecked Gulliver, made in technicolor, which opened at Hunt's Indian theatre, Sunday.
