

Redondo Beach In Fight Against Sea

REDONDO BEACH, Calif., Feb. 6.—(AP)—Hundreds of men and women, dumped ballast along this city's shoreline today as giant waves and ground swells continued to batter ocean front structures.

Years were expressed that still higher tides the next week might increase the damage, estimated at least \$10,000. The damage was done during this morning's tide.

Men and women had worked to rather filling sandbags in a five-block area of the "grand walk," roped off and guarded by police. The walk has been undermined for a distance of four blocks.

Tenants moved from one apartment house threatened with undermining. Front porches and balconies of several beach houses tumbled into the sea, along with small shops built on the sand.

Where once the strand sloped away gently from the boardwalk, it was now a drop of 15 feet to oily sand. One 20-foot section fell into the boiling waters.

Scientists have offered storms at sea or some mysterious subterranean upheaval as an explanation for the combers, but admit inability to advance a definite reason.

Roosevelt Gives Figures to Show U. S. Income Up

HYDE PARK, N. Y., Feb. 6.—(AP)—Declaring his goal still was an annual national income of \$50,000,000,000, President Roosevelt tossed a batch of what he termed "pretty formidable statistics" yesterday at assailants of the administration's domestic program.

He cited at a press conference figures to show America's income had jumped 21 per cent between 1932 and 1939, from \$4,000,000,000 to \$50,000,000,000. Income now is running at a rate of over \$70,000,000,000 annually, he said.

With an income level of \$50,000,000,000, Mr. Roosevelt asserted, the budget would be a little better than balanced.

The statistics were designed to demonstrate that there had been big gains since the new deal took over in 1933. In wages and salaries, factory payrolls, cash farm income, non-agricultural employment, exports and industrial production,

"Manchester martyrs" A postal investigation disclosed that the bomb which exploded in Birmingham was posted just after last night's announcement that Home Secretary Sir John Anderson would not interfere with the executions.

Today's Irish government appeal to Chamberlain came after many mass meetings in Ireland in recent

days demanding reprieves. With refusal of these last night, the bomb-blasters followed today.

Tom Barry, a Cork Irish republican leader, telegraphed Prime Minister De Valera of Eire today asking him to request four-day reprieves to enable him to place before the home secretary in London "proof" that the men were innocent.

In blaming today's blasts on the I. R. A., police said the familiar "bullet-type" bombs had been used in the Euston blast. The bombs were in mail bags consigned to Birmingham.

Blast Scene Crowded The station was crowded. In it were many soldiers on leave, one of those injured was detained at an eye hospital for injuries about the eyes, while the others were treated for abrasions and shock.

Flames followed the Birmingham post office explosion, but were extinguished quickly.

Joseph Hewitt, 29, acquitted of murder in the Coventry blast, was freed today on charges of conspiracy to cause explosions, possessing explosives and causing an explosion. The prosecution offered no evidence against him.

Barnes and Richards were sentenced Dec. 14, receiving the first death penalties in the I. R. A. campaign of terror against the British.

The I. R. A. bombings began in January, 1939. The organization is outlawed in Ireland, opposed by the De Valera government because of its methods. The organization uses terrorism to fight Britain's ties with Ireland.

G. O. P. May Meet in June. Rep. Martin of Massachusetts, the house republican leader, said today that the republican convention might be held in June. He expressed that opinion at a breakfast given by Kansas congressmen for Governor and Mrs. Payne Rafter of Kansas.

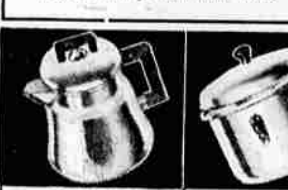

ments and the federal courts.

"Every unit of the government must bear some proportion of the retrenchments," said the committee in submitting the revised figures.

The reduction brought to \$196,200,000 the amount slashed from presidential estimates in a half dozen appropriation measures now before congress.

The \$197,379,990 bill for the three departments and the courts, reported to the house for immediate consideration, contained funds for

such activities as counter-espionage, anti-trust investigations and the 1940 census. The total was \$2,442,529 before appropriations for the current year.

Census Cost Heavy. It's going to cost the government about \$53,000,000 to take the 1940 census.

Census bureau officials told the house appropriations subcommittee that the population count alone will require \$17,370,484.

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
