

Agent of Russia Ousted by Swiss

Eviction Follows Red Cross
Pleas for Poland, Finland,
Which Moscow Ignored.

BERNE, Feb. 8.—(AP)—Switzerland today ordered Soviet Russia's league of nations expert, Vladimir Sokolov, to leave the country within two weeks.

The order was issued by both the Swiss federal and Geneva cantonal governments, rejecting Moscow's explanation for wanting to keep Sokolov in Switzerland.

Sokolov was dismissed as an undersecretary of the league of nations after Soviet Russia's expulsion and Moscow had tried to obtain authorization for him to remain in Geneva as "liaison officer" to the international Red Cross committee.

League experts, busy coordinating league members' aid to Finland, have made no secret of their displeasure at having a trained Soviet observer remaining in Geneva.

The international Red Cross committee, which appealed to Russia during the Polish campaign and since the Soviet invasion of Poland without reply, found Sokolov had no authorization to confer with it despite his new title.

PARIS, Feb. 8.—(AP)—The French government was reliably reported today to have refused to consider a Soviet Russian protest against a police raid today on the Russian commercial office in Paris.

Sources close to the foreign office said the protest lodged by Soviet Ambassador Surits could not be entertained, as neither the trade representatives nor the commercial offices had diplomatic immunity.

Three Russian commercial agents were held during the raid, foreign officials said, but later were released.

It was disclosed that immediately after the raid Surits demanded the government release the agents and return seized documents.

Informal sources said the Soviet envoy was told that diplomatic immunity for the agents existed, but that the French-Russian trade agreement and that the offices, even under the agreement, never had extraterritorial privileges.

To Aid Advertising Of Dairy Products

Should the dairy industry do something about advertising and promoting the sale of dairy products, or should it let competitive products do the advertising and depend on selling its own on a low price basis?

This vital question facing the Oregon dairy industry is to be put before a joint session of the Oregon Dairy Manufacturers' association and the Oregon Dairywomen's association, when the two meet on Thursday, February 22, on the campus at Oregon State college.

The manufacturers are holding their session Wednesday and Thursday of that week, while the producers will meet Thursday and Friday. These two conventions, together with the annual short course put on by the dairy department at the college, will make this the most comprehensive dairy industries week so far arranged in this state.

Bringing the national viewpoint on the matter of dairy advertising will be Milton Hult, president of the National Dairy Council, who will be a featured speaker. President Hult is coming from Chicago to the west coast for addresses in California and Washington, as well as here. Another feature of the producers' program will be a thorough discussion of the present dairy herd size situation in Oregon, and how it can be improved, says Rector W. Morse, extension dairyman and secretary of the association.

All persons interested in the dairy industry are invited to attend any part of the week's program, regardless of whether they are members of the associations concerned.

STOUGHTON, Mass., Feb. 8.—(AP)—The annual town report indicated Stoughton had the most phenomenal birth rate in the world during 1939. The medical officer's report on vital statistics gave deaths during the year at "12.18 per thousand," and births, "16.90 per person."

Federal Road Aid To Oregon Upped

PORTLAND, Feb. 7.—(AP)—Federal highway officials for the western state confirmed today that Oregon would receive \$3,766,974 for road projects the coming fiscal year.

J. S. Bright, regional construction engineer for the public road administration, said the amount was \$700,000 more than a year ago.

Primary roads will receive \$1,844,937, secondary farm-to-market roads \$245,861, railroad grade crossing elimination \$355,220, roads on Indian reservations and other federal lands \$129,201, main highways through national forests \$1,171,755.

The engineer explained that Oregon "got every penny made available by congress" because the state gasoline tax was not diverted from road purposes.

Discussing conferences between the public road administration, highway commission and the army, Bright said:

"The three groups have agreed that roads that best serve peace time needs, will serve war time needs. In Oregon we will merely carry forward the program of highway modernization previously determined for peace time. This includes the raising of roads to higher standards to permit safer and faster travel and the strengthening of bridges."

"Studies already made indicate all present primary highway bridges strong enough to support the heaviest equipment in the army."
