OREGON AND WASHINGTON REPUBLICANS END SPAT

SEATTLE, Feb. 8.—(AP)—Republican party leaders in Washington and Oregon have buried the hatchet in their dispute over the seating arrangements at the meeting for Thomas E. Dewey in Portland next Monday night.

The allotment of tickets for the Washington delegation has been increased from 400 to 600 and some of the tickets are for first floor seats. In addition Washington State Chairman Tom Galschott has been given a five-minute part in the program.

with the erection of a new residence, and other buildings.

Pictured herewith, also, is the Camas Valley combined high school and grade school, erected in 1928 at a cost of \$40,000, plus about \$5,000 for furnishings and equipment.

It is beautifully located, on a low embankment not far from the store. One hundred students attend classes there, and they are presided over by a staff of six teachers. Ross Brown, whom I prevailed upon to stand at the corner of the building when I took the picture, to furnish "boomman interest," is the principal. He is the son of Arthur Brown of Salem, organizer for the state grange, who is well known in Douglas county. He is a nephew of the late Wilfred Brown, of Camas Valley.

An exceedingly fine farm in Camas Valley is that of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Parrott. It consists of 200 acres, mostly in crop to grain; about 30 acres in irrigated alfalfa, and 90 acres to hairy vetch.

The Parrotts maintain a dairy herd of 20 cows, all of which, with two or three exceptions, are Holsteins.

Mr. Parrott is finishing construction of a large dairy barn, and a large milking, cooling and bottling plant, also pictured herewith. In

the latter he is installing, this spring, a modern refrigeration system to care for the milk, which is sold whole to a Roseburg dairy. Baiting of the grade "A" cow milk is done at the farm.

In upper Camas Valley, is located the Harmsen-Walshfeld saw mill, operating in the timber, and

employing about eighteen men in the mill and woods. It has a capacity of 25,000 feet of lumber per day.

Although not operating at the present moment, Chetfield and son own a cedar mill in upper Camas, which seasonally furnishes additional employment to Camas Valley's available labor.

not loan "might contravene our foreign policy."

Jones Want Repayment
Jesse H. Jones, federal loan administrator, was disclosed as having told congress that he would have to be "reasonably certain" of repayment before he would approve even a limited extension of credit to Finland.

This became known when the senate foreign relations committee made public testimony given by Jones in a closed hearing on legislation to expand the lending power of the export-import bank by \$10,000,000. The committee approved the bill yesterday by 12 to 6 vote.

Jones testified that everything that would affect the ability of Finland to repay, including her chances of surviving in her undeclared war with Russia, would be considered before the export-import bank would advance any additional money to buy non-military supplies. The bank already has granted Finland \$10,000,000 in credits.

BRITAIN STILL AIDING FINNS, CHAMBERLAIN SAYS

LONDON, Feb. 8.—(AP)—Prime Minister Chamberlain told the house of commons today further British aid for Finland was on the way and "the help given from this country has been of real value to Finland."

The success attending Finnish arms, Chamberlain said, "has evoked the admiration of the world."

This statement drew loud cheers from the legislators.

The Finnish people continue their heroic struggle against an enemy who is using his huge air fleets in a vain endeavor to shake their spirit by bombing the homes of the poor, shattering with high explosives hospitals full of wounded men and pursuing defenseless citizens with machine guns," Chamberlain declared.

Reports said the first contingent of British volunteers might

leave for Finland next week. With the apparent blessing of the British government, which said yesterday substantial material aid was on its way to Finland, the Finnish legation has arranged the enlistment of "hundreds" of volunteers in Finland.

Of the air warfare between Britain and Germany the prime minister said:

"It would appear that instructions have been given to enemy pilots to do their utmost to avoid contact with our defenses."

On the western front France and Germany both reported renewed fighting activity, but there was no indication of any more important military developments.

Neutrals to Swell Armies
The war's effect in southeastern Europe was indicated by a survey showing that the small neutrals there plan to step up military preparations soon in fear that spring might bring the conflict into their territory.

All of the nations—Rumania, Yugoslavia, Hungary, Bulgaria, Greece and Turkey—either will have thousands more in their military ranks or in readiness for service when warmer weather makes military operations easier.

until the Finnish forces holding the Mannerheim line are annihilated, Admiral Tributz, commander of the soviet navy in the Baltic sea, said yesterday.

The admiral's pledge of continued war was made in connection with the bestowal of decorations on 225 naval officers and men "for exemplary fulfillment of tasks on the front against the white Finns."

The communist newspaper Pravda at the same time accused Britain and France of "striving to turn the war tides against the soviet union."

"But plans for utilizing Finland as a base for military intervention against the soviet union shall be crushed by red army blows," the newspaper declared.

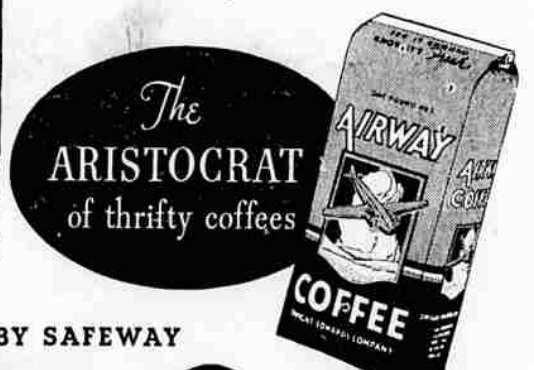
