One Youth Killed, Four Others Hurt in Crash

EVERETT, Wash., Feb. 7.—(AP)—Jens Jensen, 16, Arlington, died in an Everett hospital early this morning after a midnight automobile collision on the Pacific highway ten miles north of Marysville. Jensen was one of eight boys and girls of high school age riding in a coupe with a rumble seat. Their northbound car, driven by Chester Jensen, 18, brother of Jens, crashed head-on into another automobile, according to P. D. Kaufman, state

Trade Treaty Extension Given Committee's O. K.

to the creation of world peace.

Opposition Widespread
Opponents included various trade, labor and agricultural groups which argued that American markets were adversely affected by lowering tariff barriers.

The National Grange opposed, and the American Farm Bureau federation defended continuation of the authority. Opponents said that if they were unable to end trade agreements entirely they would attempt to subject them to ratification by the senate. Hall said such a maneuver, if successful, would make the system virtually worthless by laying each agreement open to the attacks of special interests.

Defense Bill Sent to F. R.
The house completed legislative action on a \$24,225,588 emergency national defense appropriation bill and sent it to the White House for President Roosevelt's signature.

A conference report agreeing to a reduction of \$12,270,000 made by the senate was adopted without a record vote. As finally agreed to, the bill was \$19,955,588 below budget estimates.

Rep. Woodrum (D., Va.), chairman of the house conference, said the principal reductions were effected in funds appropriated for military maneuvers next summer, which were cut from \$18,000,000 to \$15,000,000.

Senate Votes Funds
The senate passed today a \$1,179,782,528 appropriation bill carrying funds for more than a score of government agencies and bureaus. The total approved was \$39,596,291 more than the sum voted by the house.

The measure was returned to the house for action on amendments—principally one allotting \$350,000 to the maritime commission's construction fund. This and other increases were offset in part by minor reductions.

Pelley testified previously today that if the Dies committee continued its investigations of un-

American activities his Silver Shirts legion would "fold up."

Pelley, whose group has been called "fascist" by the committee, told the house investigators that conditions as far as un-American activities were concerned, had improved in the last few years.

He attributed much of the improvement to the work of the Dies committee.

"Do you mean that if the Dies committee continues its investigation," asked Representative Thomas (R., N. J.), "that the Silver Shirts will fold up?"

"Yes sir, and with my blessings," Pelley promptly replied. He had testified yesterday that the aim of the Silver Shirts paralleled that of the committee in that both were against un-American activities.

Roosevelt Shielded
Starnes said that at yesterday's hearing he had stopped a line of questioning involving President Roosevelt because he was afraid Pelley might use the occasion to "say something personal" against Mr. Roosevelt.

Opening the second day of testimony from Pelley, Starnes recalled he had forbidden the witness to reply when Representative Voorhis (D., Calif.), asked about a statement he attributed to Pelley "that the president of the United States had converted funds for

the infantile paralysis campaign for his own use."

Voorhis had asserted Pelley made the reference to Mr. Roosevelt in one of his publications, "Liberation," last fall.
