

Broadway Clowns

Post 35-to-26 Win

Basketball Fans Entertained Not Only With Fast Play but With Rior of Mirth.

The dusky-tinted Broadway Clowns, touring basketball team from Harlem, New York, amazed and delighted a capacity crowd at Roseburg senior high last night with a comical exhibition of razzle-dazzle basketball in defeating a local organization of cage talent, the Casa Street Clowns, 35 to 26.

The Clowns amazed the local populace with their almost unbelievable dexterity in ball handling, passing the circular disks over, under and around their bewildered and amused opponents with ridiculous ease, and demonstrated an uncanny ability to score whenever they felt like doing so, or at least conveying that impression.

These ebony-hued basketballers, just five in number, delighted the throng with their clownish antics, court buffoonery and zany playing. It was a circus to hear as well as a basketball game, and a rapid-fire quarter 1, they went into outlandish formations and scoring systems.

Goals Easy For Clowns
No one appeared to care a great deal about the ultimate results of the contest, for though the score was close during most of the game, the Clowns from Harlem always had the situation under control. As soon as the locals would draw within six or eight points, and sometimes an even smaller margin, the visitors would put on a scorching spree which resulted in goals scored with disgusting ease.

The Broadway Clowns were past masters in crazy antics. They never used the fast break, in fact, they advanced the ball in just the opposite fashion—in slow southern style. They used football formations, with shifts, long forward passes, and once even droppedkick the length of the floor from almost behind their own goal line.

They played "ring-around-rose," formed daisy chains, lined up all five men on the center court line, collected in one corner of the floor, bounced the ball for goals, and did everything else in the book, cock-eyed, but it was all a lot of fun, amusing players and referees as well as spectators.

The much publicized "blackout" exhibition, scheduled to be presented before the regular contest, was not performed, because the ghost basketball game had been copyrighted by its originators a few days before and a telegram received recently forbade them to present this unusual feature.

Result Never In Doubt
The game was very close for one quarter, probably because the Clowns wanted to give the fans a run for their money—a very good brand of mob psychology—but the outcome was apparent. The score was tied three times in the first quarter, but the winners were out in front, 16-8 at the quarter, 14-8 at halftime, 24-18 at the three-quarter mark.

A big, black center, Bryant, was high scorer for the evening with 17, closely followed by a teammate, "Runt" Pullins, forward, with 14. Big Jim Watts, coach at senior high, still showed flashes of "crazy" form, played about two quarters and scored eight. Clifford Horner, Sutherland coach, "Chub" Church and Ray Morgan played good ball for Roseburg.

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Godoy Conceded No Chance With Louis

Bomber's Expected Victory Tonight Considered Only Matter of Rounds.

NEW YORK, Feb. 9.—(AP)—About 10:30 tonight, unless all signs are wrong, Joe Louis will be ready to sit down to his first fight in six weeks, still heavyweight champion of the world.

That gives him half an hour, or approximately seven rounds of his scheduled 15-round title bout with Arturo Godoy, the Chilean challenger, which is slated to get under way at 10 p. m. eastern standard time in Madison Square garden before a crowd of more than 15,000. And not even Arturo's relatives down there in Iquique think the Brown Bomber will need any more time than that to dispose of this sixth aspirant to his heavyweight throne.

Of course, Arturo of the Andes could make little history by taking the crown away from the dusky one-man wrecking crew, but so could the statue of Billie Penn dive off the top of Philadelphia's city hall into the Delaware river. That's about as much chance as the boys and girls are giving the rough tough Godoy and his South American way. The odds-layers still were holding Louis a 1 to 7 favorite today, but if you had any folding money to put on 27-year-old Arturo's nose, you could get almost any price you named.

May Last 5 or 6 Rounds.

Godoy's best chance appeared to be in staying in a crouch and crowding in close as long as possible. Because just as sure as it happened to Galento and Uzcudun before him, as soon as Arturo comes out of the shell to take a peek at what's happening, there's going to be a slight explosion—right on the end of his chin.

Remembering from Godoy's previous United States invasion a couple of years back that he is a better-than-average body puncher and considerably more adept in the crouching, hobbling, crowding style than is Two-Ton Tony, this corner figures the Chilean fisherman can stick around for a while. He's going to get curious along about the sixth round. He'll come to the surface, and any time after the fifth ends, so will Arturo's challenge, this corner believes.

Louis to Get \$40,000.

As usual, Louis isn't doing his work for nothing.

The greatest box office attraction since Dempsey, will lure some 15,000 to 19,000 into paying about \$10,000 to see him roll out his artillery.

Of this, Louis is to receive 10 percent, less taxes, or about \$40,000, thereby boosting his ring earnings in the five years since he started to punch for pay to more than \$1,700,000. Godoy, who was no ball of fire on his previous appearances in U. S. rings—though losing only one of 12 figures to pick up about \$17,500.
