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IN the spring of 1933 when the whole nation went code crazy and NRA was in its flower, the newspaper publishing industry rebelled at signing a code that would be equivalent to licensing the press and so curb its freedom. The president was very angry over the refusal of the publishers to sign the code without insertion of a clause therein specifically asserting the freedom of the press. In expressing his indignation, F. D. R. coined the word "surplusage" concerning the freedom clause.

Not all of the publishing industry, however, entered wholeheartedly into the fight against the original code. The National Editorial association, an organization made up mostly of weekly newspapers, apparently thought the daily newspaper organizations were fighting against the administration rather than fighting for the freedom of the press. At least that was the impression that drifted out of NEA headquarters.

(The wages and hours law, an administration measure, later exempted weekly newspapers having a circulation of 3000 or less.)

But last week the National Editorial association's president warned Ohio publishers that "thoughts of a lot of people are running toward throttling" American freedom of the press.

Howard W. Palmer, Greenwich, Conn., publisher and head of NEA, in an address prepared for the Ohio newspaper association convention, declared:

"We face attacks upon our society through unreasonable restrictions on our shop. We face a hostile group of bureaucrats at Washington who would attack us by cutting off a large part of our advertising revenue."

Citing a proposed inquiry by the federal trade commission into the effect of national advertising on distribution costs, Palmer added:

"It will take all of the resources of all the newspapers, large and small, to combat such unfair attacks. And yet that may not be the worst. We live in a day when the thoughts of a lot of people are running toward throttling of the press in many other ways."

"There are many in Washington who would delight in seeing a situation arise which would give an excuse for muzzling the press."

Study of plans for mobilizing American manpower in the event of war, Palmer said, showed that "certainly our vaunted freedom of the press would disappear."

President Palmer has voiced the opinion held by a great many publishers during the code days. There is, and has been for some years, an effort going on to strike back at newspapers—apparently because so many of them have been forthright in their criticism of the new deal. It is a healthy sign that the smaller papers too are beginning to pull an ear in the boot with the other publishers.

No democracy in which the press is free has ever failed and no government has remained a democracy when the press was throttled.

THE thought isn't a stranger to Europe. Day before yesterday Premier

Daladier's own radical-socialist party (not very radical and not very much socialist) adopted a resolution calling upon the French government to "take all necessary steps to permit Finland to continue to fight and win her war against Russia."

The French people see quite plainly that if Finland is crushed, France's enemies will be strengthened.
