ROSEBURG WOMEN LEAVE FOR CONFERENCE

Mrs. Ned Dixon, child welfare chairman for the Roseburg area, American Legion auxiliary, and Mrs. I. H. Riegel, hospital service chairman for the Roseburg area, left Sunday for Tucson, Arizona, to attend the annual rehabilitation conference in area E of the national organization to be held Wednesday and Thursday and to be followed on Friday and Saturday by the child welfare conference for the same area.

Chairmen of the 13 departments in the western division will submit reports on their accomplishments to date and participate in a round table discussion for the purpose of presenting new ideas to the leaders in order that the two major projects of the auxiliary child welfare and rehabilitation may be solved more effectively.

During the last year nearly \$2,000,000 was expended by the Legion and auxiliary in carrying forward the child welfare program alone. Approximately 400,000 underprivileged children, 50,000 of whom were from non-veteran families, were given material assistance.

Each year the national organization of the auxiliary presents \$10,000 to the legion and also sets aside an emergency fund of \$75,000 for the use of any department in the time of disaster.

The amount of \$1500, which is allocated annually by the Oregon department to Mrs. Weber and Mrs. Riegel for child welfare work, is supplemented generously by "Check a Month" gifts from units throughout the state.
