SALEM'S FIRST JUNIOR CITIZEN TO VISIT ROSEBURG THIS WEEK

Don Douris, taller in the U. S. National bank at Salem, who was on Monday awarded the honor of being Salem's first junior citizen with Gov. Charles A. Sprague making the presentation of the plaque, will be in Roseburg Saturday and Sunday to meet with the young people.

Methodist ninth and senior high students have been invited to attend a party Saturday evening at the Methodist church, at which time Mr. Douris will have charge of a number of interesting games played at the international youth's conference last summer in Amsterdam, Holland, and which he attended as a delegate. Mr. Douris will be accompanied to Roseburg by Mark Moorman, student at Willamette university from Blaine, an assistant scoutmaster; Richard Hatford, from Oregon State college and a junior assistant scoutmaster; and Francis Ryerson, student at Willamette university from Astoria. The party will leave Salem Saturday afternoon and will be dinner guests at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Wiley on South Kane street, after which the group will attend the party at the Methodist church.

Sunday evening Mr. Douris has invited the young people of Roseburg to attend the Methodist Epworth league meeting at 6:30 o'clock, at which time he will talk on "We Enjoyed in the Various Countries We Visited Last Summer." Sunday evening Mr. Douris will speak at the evening church service of the Methodist church on the theme, "New Friends in Old Countries."

Don Douris is coach of three basketball teams in Salem, besides being scoutmaster of the largest Boy Scout troop in that city and taking a leading part in numerous civic enterprises. As Salem's first junior citizen, Mr. Douris was elected to honor at the Monday meeting of the chamber of commerce in that city.

Since September, Mr. Douris has visited 92 young people's groups in Oregon, giving talks on the international youth conference held in Amsterdam, Holland, and promoting interest in the young Methodist people of the state.
