

Forum Luncheons Started By C. of C.

Enthusiasm Shown at First of Series of Meetings to Promote City's Welfare.

The Roseburg chamber of commerce yesterday held the first of a series of weekly forum luncheons with a large group of officers and members present at the Umpqua hotel. The meeting was entirely successful and those present expressed enthusiasm over similar luncheon gatherings planned for the remainder of the winter and the early spring months.

The program was opened by Tom Parkinson, president, who staged for the benefit of the audience his regular radio broadcast feature, during which he explained to the radio audience the plans for the forum luncheons.

Steen Johnson, chairman of the forum luncheon committee, outlined his plans and declared that one of the principal aims will be to make the weekly meetings a clearing house for ideas. He urged that non-members attend the luncheons and that they express ideas for the betterment of conditions within the community.

It was announced that efforts would be made to introduce brief talks by outside speakers at intervals, but that the major part of each program would be given over to informal discussions of local affairs.

V. V. Harpham, supervisor of the Umpqua national forest, urged the widest possible publicity for chamber of commerce activities in order that the general public may be kept informed on efforts made for community betterment.

T. H. Ness, Copea manager for the Roseburg area, outlined his experiences with chamber of commerce luncheons at Marshfield and gave suggestions for future programs.

L. A. Rhoden, local director on the state board of the Associated Employers of Oregon, urged that a local delegation attend a state conference to be held Monday, February 19, at Corvallis.

It was announced that the chamber of commerce luncheons will be held every Wednesday at noon at the Umpqua hotel and that all members and any other interested persons are urged to attend.

**California Streams Shut
to Protect Game Fish**

SACRAMENTO, Feb. 14.—(AP)—All streams flowing into the Pacific ocean along the Humboldt county coast were closed to trout and salmon fishing today until June 1 under an order of Richard E. Sachse, director of natural resources.

The order was recommended by the state fish and game commission and approved by Governor Olson as a conservation measure to protect young game fish. It affects all streams with headwaters in Trinity, Humboldt, Mendocino, Glenn and Lake counties flowing into the Pacific ocean along the Humboldt county coast.

All tributaries, lagoons, lakes and reservoirs to these streams also are included in the order which adds a month to the north coast area's closed season.
