BOSTON, Feb. 16.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin will say tomorrow:

"The wool market continues deadlier for the most part. A little business is still possible for Canada but higher prices in South American crossbred wools make that more difficult. Domestic consumers are showing little or no interest in offerings, reflecting the uncertain situation in New York where only a little piecing-out business is reported."

"Foreign markets keep very firm and South America is slightly dearer."

"A highlight of the week was the rejection of 27 1/2 cents, the highest of eight bids for the Sawyer clip at Phoenix, Arizona. These figures about 83-84 cents clean basis at Boston."

"Some contracting of mohair is reported in Texas out of the new clip at 50 cents for adult and 60 cents for kid. The Boston market is hardly changed."
