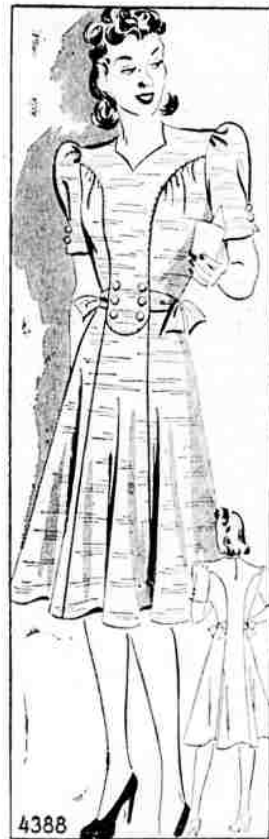
RICHARD ARUNDEL ENTERTAINS C. E.

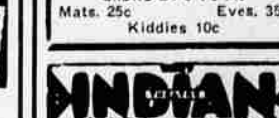
