BEYOND receiving an adequate pay check, the most comforting thing to the average worker is a reasonable assurance that he will continue to receive the same check next week and the week after. This is the kind of security he wants more than unemployment compensation and old-age guarantees. He wants to feel that he will be employed long enough each year to insure his family against sudden stoppage of income or pay insufficient to cover his normal needs.

Those who suffer most seriously from sporadic pay checks are workers in the building trades, whose hourly rates of pay look good, but whose annual pay never seems to add up to what they expect. Their employment is strictly seasonal, and many of them are lucky if they can clear \$1000 a year, although they may be working for \$1.50 an hour.

Fully aware of this problem, which long has threatened the financial security of their members, the building trades are grappling with a plan to assure workers of a specified annual wage. According to News Analyst Willis Thornton, nearly a million workers will be asked to decide on this issue during the next year.

Thornton selected a typical trade to illustrate how the plan might work. The average painter in Cleveland now gets \$1.50 an hour, works an average of 25 weeks a year, collecting about \$1000 a year. Under the proposed plan, the painter would be guaranteed 12 weeks of steady work at an annual rate of \$1680. His hourly rate would fall from \$1.50 to about \$1.40, but he will have earned nearly \$700 more at the end of the year.

Those building tradesmen now earning more than the proposed standard wage naturally object to the plan. For those few, it would mean an annual decrease in wages. That would be the price of providing higher pay and a better form of security for the industry in general. Unionists are not quite sure generally how they feel about the plan. Some are resisting it because of the decrease in the hourly rate. But many practical union men, including many building trades union leaders, are actively supporting the proposal.

The plan for establishing annual wages is not new. It has long been advocated by certain groups as a means of setting up some semblance of security. President Roosevelt suggested it for the auto industry, but the unions lacked. Several individual employers have already set up systems whereby a fixed 52-week pay rate is determined each year in advance on the basis of company earnings during the preceding year.

The fair labor standards act opened the gate for annual wage plans by setting up specific provisions for employers wishing to establish employee relations upon this basis. Institution of such a plan, especially in industries affected by seasonal layoffs and fluctuations, would be of inestimable benefit to workers and could conceivably be worked out on a sound economic basis for the employer.

There would most certainly be objections to the plan if it were widely circulated, and those would have to be met. But it is something to think about in an age when security of every kind has become the most important consideration in the lives of American workers.

Residents of Terrace Park, the district beyond the end of East Lane street, were assured by the city council last night that steps will be taken immediately to improve the hillside roadway. A delegation appeared before the council at its short session last night and reported that recent storms had washed off the gravel and had cut deep ruts in the road bed. The street committee was instructed by the council to investigate conditions at once and to make such repairs as are needed.

The council was told that the road could be put in good condition by opening drainage ditches, grading the surface and putting gravel in a few wet spots.

This ranging from \$1 to \$25 were received for the house standing at Jackson and Lane streets where the property recently was donated by the county court to the city for park purposes. The \$25 offer of Fred Nichols and J. A. Peterson was accepted, with the condition that they supply a bond to free the city from any liability in the event of injuries resulting from the destruction of the building.

Another difficult task recently was completed when pipe was laid under the Southern Pacific company tracks at the end of Burke street. One of the conditions under which the railroad company gave a right of way which the tracks should not be disturbed. To meet this condition the workmen jacked an iron culvert, 12 inches in diameter, under the tracks. A workman inside the pipe shoveled out rock and dirt from ahead of the culvert which was moved forward as the hole was cleared. Concrete sewer pipe, 18 inches in diameter, then was laid inside the metal culvert.

The South Roseburg section of the sewer system is nearly complete, except for the construction of the tunnel, upon which work has been started. As soon as the tunnel section is finished, there will be a few short links to connect the intercepting line with the main sewer. This connection will be made as soon as the disposal plant is ready for operation.

Work is progressing satisfactorily on the disposal plant, where a large crew is at work. The largest of the concrete tanks used in sewage treatment already have been completed, and some of the equipment installed.

Financing Shown
The intercepting sewer system and the sewage disposal plant are being constructed as WPA projects. The city of Roseburg has furnished materials and has paid engineering costs, while the labor has been furnished by the WPA. The federal agency also supplied a considerable cash grant for use in purchase of some of the materials for the disposal plant.

The sewer system up to Jan. 1 of this year has cost the city \$12,775.50, according to a recent report by Recorder J. G. Giddens. Difficulties In Sewer Task Met

Latest Detail in Roseburg's Project is 300-Ft. Tunnel; Disposal Unit Progresses.

One of the final difficult tasks in connection with the construction of Roseburg's intercepting sewer system now is under way in the south part of town, where a tunnel is to be dug for a distance of approximately 300 feet to connect the south Roseburg sewer to the system. The tunnel will extend from Short street to Mill street, cutting through a high rock bank. Due to the fact that the digging is in a formation of rotten rock, according to all indications, extra care will be required in tunneling the bore in order to prevent injury to workmen.

The intercepting sewer system has offered several difficult engineering tasks. During the past summer months work was completed on a siphon which carries the pipe line under the South Umpqua river from Laurewood. A similar siphon was built under Deer creek. The ditch for the siphon was blasted from solid rock and the pipe line was set in concrete. Large sediment basins are provided at each end and provision has been made for clearing out the siphons as needed. Sewage will be forced through the siphons by means of pumps.

Home Treatment

You may ask what you should do to cure the flu. If a doctor is not available, the following is suggested as a basis for home treatment of a flu patient:

1. Go to bed at the first sign of illness and stay there for several days after your fever is gone, since relapse is frequent.
2. Drink water freely, stay on a liquid diet during the first few days and so on soft food about the fourth day. Then gradually return to the normal diet.
3. Do not use cathartics; enemata are better than laxatives.
4. Do not suppress coughs, but place all nasal and bronchial secretions in disposable tissues.
5. You may take a warm bath at the onset of the attack to relieve back, head and limb pains, but a warm bed and warm drink afterward are essential. Excessive sweating is dangerous.
6. Do not use medicines unless prescribed by a physician. Remember that good nursing and resting in bed are the best methods of staying off complications. Patients generally should be isolated; old people especially should be guarded against all possible sources of infection.
