

Labor Boycott Hits Oregon Employers

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 20. (AP)—An out-of-state boycott against the products of Oregon employers who sponsored the state's labor control law was approved by Oregon American Federation of Labor leaders here yesterday.

The plan, drawn by Meyer Lewis, San Francisco, western AFL director, is directed against manufacturers who campaigned for the law, and to those active in its defense since it was approved.

President Phil Brady of the Portland and central labor council proposed Lewis' offer of outside assistance meeting of AFL union chiefs. The vote in favor was unanimous.

The action replaced a conciliatory program adopted by the state AFL convention and accepted by Ross McIntyre, Portland chamber of commerce president, on behalf of the state's largest group of employers. The labor leaders, however, declared this program had broken down. R. H. Mathis, secretary of the Portland and the state building trades councils, decried further attempts by labor to work out problems at chamber of commerce conference tables.

John O'Neill, ironworkers' union, called small chambers of commerce labor's "worst enemies."

Associated Industries of Oregon was described as "another Associated Farmers of Oregon," a sponsor of the labor law.

Klamath Man Kills Self Over Domestic Trouble

KLAMATH FALLS, Feb. 20.—(AP)—When Mrs. Fay Morris opened her door last night in response to loud knocks, a bleeding man staggered in and collapsed on the floor.

He was a neighbor, Charles Reeves, 26, dying from a gunshot wound police later said was self-inflicted. He died in a hospital this morning after telling officers he had had matrimonial difficulties.

New Drug Drags Man From Death

TACOMA, Wash., Feb. 20.—(AP)—Because of a new drug, Don Davies, 31-year-old national guard aviator accidentally stabbed in the face with a bayonet, is probably going to recover from an infection that appeared hopelessly fatal, Dr. George A. Mooney, Tacoma physician, said today.

Davies, a Tacoma policeman, is suffering streptococcal and pneumococcal meningitis resulting from the unusual stabbing, Dr. Mooney said.

"Yesterday I didn't give Davies one chance in a million of pulling through," the young doctor said. "Today I think the chances are 100 to one that he'll recover."

He credits the new drug, intravenous salt of sulfapyridine, with the unbelievable change in Davies' condition.

"The drug is new and we don't know a great deal about it," Dr. Mooney said. "I don't think it has ever been used on the Pacific coast before. We are injecting it into Davies' bloodstream every four hours."

Davies was stabbed through the right cheek last Tuesday at Tacoma armory when another guardsman, a bayonet attached to his rifle, came through a swinging door just as Davies moved toward it.

Dr. Mooney said the blade passed through Davies' cheek just below the right eyeball and the bayonet tip pierced the first layer of the guardsman's brain, starting an infection.

The wound was not considered serious until last Saturday when it became highly inflamed and Davies' temperature shot up. He was taken to Tacoma general hospital in a critical condition.
