

### Mails Censorship Causing Tension

#### Deadlock Develops Over Issue Between United States and Allied War Nations.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—(AP)—A virtual deadlock over censorship of American mails has developed between the state department and Great Britain and France, with one incident after another helping to complicate the situation.

It was learned last night that British mariners with fixed bayonets brought about the first seizure of transatlantic airmail at Bermuda on Jan. 18.

Capt. Charles A. Lorber of Baltimore, commanding a Pan-American Airways plane flying between the United States and Lisbon, had refused to surrender the mail to British censors until the show of armed force was made.

Authoritative sources at London attributed the incident to a "conflict of personalities," and added: "You can be certain it won't happen again."

That reference apparently was to the display of bayonets, for despite a prompt protest by United States officials, censorship of air mail has continued at Bermuda. Last week 1979 pounds of American mail were taken off one Clipper ship.

Secretary Hull hinted at a recent press conference that if the practice did not cease, Bermuda might be passed up as a Clipper stop.

#### Censorship Elsewhere

Mail carried from the United States by boat also is being censored at Gibraltar and Marsella; for Scandinavian nations at Kirkwall, Scotland; for Netherlands ports at Weymouth, England. Mail in Palestine is a censorship point for the near east.

It is understood there are other censorship headquarters in Britain and France, and mails destined for the United States are also censored at those cities.

When the United States liner Manhattan arrived at New York last night from Italy, her captain said the British removed 529 sacks of mail at Gibraltar on the east-bound trip and held the ship 27 hours. On the return voyage she was held nine hours.

### Wheeler Shuns Primary in Ohio

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21.—(AP)—Friends of Senator Wheeler (D, Mont.) reported today he had decided to stay out of Ohio's May 15 democratic primary.

With the refusal of Senator Donahy (D, Ohio) to run as a "favorite son" candidate ready to support a third term for President Roosevelt, there was speculation Wheeler might go into the race against Vice-President Garner, who is expected to file later.

An informal coalition of Taft and Vandenberg forces was reported to be trying to keep Thomas E. Dewey from getting a head start for the republican presidential nomination in the Wisconsin primary April 2.

Although Senator Taft of Ohio announced last Saturday that he would not enter the Wisconsin contest, first major pre-convention battle, friends said there was good reason to believe he would give quiet support to Senator Vandenberg of Michigan.

The theory, they explained, is that Vandenberg appears to have a better chance to beat Dewey in Wisconsin. Taft's father, the late William Howard Taft, fought the elder LaFollette, and hence his backers entertained little hope of support from the LaFollette progressives.

The democratic picture, meanwhile, continued to place the third term question in the foreground.

Oscar Ewing, eastern campaign manager for Paul V. McNutt, said that President Roosevelt would be "almost the unanimous choice of the democratic convention for a third term if he does not take himself out of the running."

He added: "I don't think it is likely that Roosevelt will be elected for a third term."

### Yanks Aiding British Fed Home-Like "Hot Dogs"

SEATTLE, Feb. 21.—(AP)—Yankee aviators enlisted in Great Britain's air force were given hot dogs to "make them feel at home" at a big Christmas party in London, a letter from Richard Egan said today.

Egan wrote A. Elliott Merrill, president of the Washington Aircraft and Transport corporation, who had trained him in flying, of the event. He told of elaborate preparations for the ball, adding: "Everywhere, however, that hot dogs were a delusion in America. Didn't Roosevelt feed them to the king?"

### Return of Gaming Devices Sought

PORTLAND, Feb. 21.—(AP)—A proposed constitutional amendment to legalize pinball machines, bank nights, punchboards and similar operations will be filed with the secretary of state later this week.

John W. Van Horn, secretary of the Oregon Merchants' Legislative league, announced today the action would be preliminary to circulating November general election petitions.

The supreme court recently outlawed activities and devices covered in the proposal as violations of the state lottery provisions.

Van Horn estimated annual receipts at \$2,500,000, the majority assigned to counties for old age assistance, from the following per cents:

Coin machine operators, \$2400 in counties of more than 50,000 population to \$200 in counties of less than 10,000; punchboard operators \$1200; coin machine distributors \$1400; punchboard distributors \$600; location privileges \$60; dealers \$150; bank nights, theatres of 200 seats \$20, in excess of 1000 seats up to \$100, plus 2 per cent of the value of awards.

Only one bingo game would be permitted in a county of less than 200,000 and not more than two in larger areas. The bill set the license fee at \$500 plus 2 per cent of the value of awards.

The measure sets fees for four years and does not provide protection for "nick-in-the-slot" devices. Administration would be assigned to the secretary of state.

The league suggested this partial division of returns: State fair \$10,000; Pacific International Livestock exposition \$10,000; Eastern Oregon Livestock show \$7500; Portland round-up \$10,000; Northwest Turkey show \$2500; county fair \$1000; Astoria regatta \$500; Portland rose festival \$15,000.

### Jobless Insurance Shakeup Advised

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21.—(AP)—Arthur J. Altmeyer, social security board chairman, declared today it was imperative the states overhaul and liberalize their unemployment insurance systems.

Altmeyer recommended the waiting period for benefits be cut to one week, that payments be made for at least 16 weeks a year, and that states with large surplus insurance funds pay two-thirds of the full-time wage up to a top payment of at least \$20.

He made public his views in the Social Security Bulletin, amplifying the board's stand previously outlined in its annual report to congress.

Altmeyer also proposed the minimum benefits paid by the states should be at least \$5 a week, partial unemployment benefits should be paid in all states, and eligibility regulations should be simplified with a view to more prompt payment.

His suggestions are not to be considered the ideal for jobless insurance standards, he said, but something to be given immediate consideration.

"States with sufficient reserves and current income (from social security taxes) may well consider making their benefits still more adequate," he added.

Altmeyer explained the state plans in the beginning of the program were kept on a conservative basis to insure the solvency of state funds.
