Mary Mills recommends—Baked Cherry Pudding with Cherry Sauce

Yield: 6 or 8 servings

1/2 cup butter 1/2 cup milk 1/2 cup sugar 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 whole egg 2 teaspoons baking powder 1/2 cup Fisher's Blend Flour 1 cup canned or frozen cherries
