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Moscow Paper Says Pope Plans Anti-Soviet Drive

MOSCOW, Feb. 22.—(AP)—Godless organ of the soviet Russian atheist league, declared today that Pope Pius XII is planning an anti-soviet crusade with the participation of the United States, Great Britain, France, Belgium and the Netherlands.

The newspaper said the pope "is fulfilling the will of British, French and American imperialists."

Godless said there are "hardly any" Roman Catholics in Finland but the pope has sent money to the "white Finns" because they are a "weapon" against the U. S. S. R.

(At the end of 1937 Roman Catholic communicants in Finland numbered 1,551, according to the statesman's yearbook.)

(The Vatican city newspaper, L'Osservatore Romano, on Feb. 6 urged Finland's friends to hasten aid against what it termed "the most cynical aggression of our time.")

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Thieves Steal 2 Floors of Untenanted Building

ALBANY, N. Y., Feb. 22.—(AP)—Imagined Building Commissioner James F. Finn's astonishment when police reported two lower floors of a frame dwelling had been stolen!

"Incredible!" he exclaimed, rushing to the scene.

But there it was, the upper story of an untenanted house suspended

between two adjoining buildings. Thieves, Finn said, had systematically picked the structure "clean as a bone," apparently removing parts for kindling wood.

He ordered the suspended portion dismantled. The owner vowed

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
