Modern Robin Hood Draws Jail Term

REDDING, Calif., Feb. 22.—(AP)—A Los Angeles man began a four month jail sentence today for stealing hundreds of pounds of food from ice boxes of prosperous homes to feed the poor.

"It's a passion with me," he explained. "Everywhere I go, all over the nation, I rob the rich to feed the poor, only this time is the first time I've been caught."

The man, Nelson Goodwin, was sentenced by Justice of the Peace R. P. Stimmel yesterday after he had pleaded guilty to petty theft charges.

Goodwin arrived in Redding at 5 a. m. Monday, police said, and went right to work doing his bit for the poor, hiding his loot of foodstuffs under a warehouse. Officers spotted him carrying a sack of victuals down the street and arrested him.

"I've seen so much misery that I resent seeing so many people with so much, and others with so little," they quoted him.

"I know it's wrong, but it's a kink in me. My arrest is an act of God to set me right. I might be able to break the kink."

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 21.—(AP)—When Sweepida came romping home a length and one quarter to the good yesterday in the \$50,000 Santa Anita derby the big tote board at the track, the allowed only \$2,072 of the \$178,424 wagered on the race was on the winner's nose.

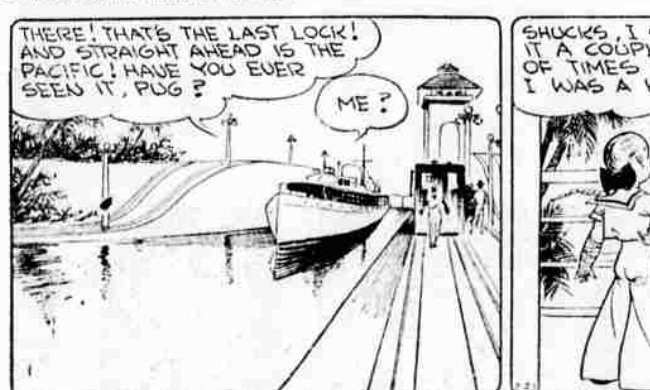
