NEW YORK—New hats for the end of winter and early spring drop into two categories. The first includes the most elemental kind of head covering (skull-caps, helmets, turbans); the second a variety of straw and felts which are a great deal less casual, essentially feminine, but not mad. Every woman will want hats of both types.

The cloche, that deep-crowned old favorite which was popular during and immediately after the first world war, has been revived. Tricornees are importantly featured, with the slightly wider ones more prominently shown than the traditional narrow kind.

In the Nicole collection, old-fashioned bonnets, be-ribboned and be-felted, catch the eyes of customers who want formal afternoon and dinner hats. Madame Nicole shows also salonnas in every possible size, wide-brimmed picture hats, mushroom shapes, and an occasional turban. There's nothing casual about her turbans, however. Intricately twisted and tied, they are made of luxurious fabrics in exclusive patterns.

Spring Will Be Colorful
Madame Nicole likes bright blue ribbons against vivid red straws; pale blue with pale pink; burnt orange veiling on aqua straw. A smart cloche of pale-golden beige straw is fluted with chenille dot veiling—the dots in a tone which for all the world resembles the coat of a sleek, graceful, yellow Persian cat.

On a powder blue sailor is poised a spray of pink roses which appear to have been freshly plucked. On a black picture hat there's a giant white camellia with one petal in camellia pink. Yards of black veiling, fetchingly tied, trim a white sailor of shiny straw. A small, old-fashioned bonnet, to be worn low and straight across the forehead, is covered with ribbon bows in a profusion of colors. And there's a mustang bow on a royal blue straw tricornee.
