American Legion Auxiliary Activities

To serve my country day by day
At any humble post I may;
To honor and respect her flag;
To live the traits of which I brag;
To be American in deed.

This patriotic creed of Edgar Guest's might well be that of all Americans at all times. It is the theme around which "Majority Day" was founded. What is a true citizen, what are his privileges, his responsibilities and his duties? Judge Carl E. Wimberly will answer these queries and explain them in an address to all young persons of twenty-one or thereabouts or for those not having voted. This "Majority Day" program will be held in the circuit court rooms at the court house Monday, Feb. 26, at eight o'clock. All young persons of 21 are urged to be there with their friends to be welcomed into citizenship. This school, for it will be of an instructional nature, is one of the many Americanism programs carried on by the Legion and its auxiliary. There could be no more fitting person to give an address of this nature than Judge Wimberly, who must have seen in his career the need for youth training in citizenship.

Mrs. Ned Dixon in her report to the auxiliary of the Area E conference at Tucson, Ariz., remarked that the statement was made at this conference that Oregon was one of the lowest ranking states in juvenile delinquency prevention, its child welfare work ranks of the best, however. The lack and need of religious training throughout the country was stressed. The state department of the Auxiliary maintains an office for child welfare work in the Medical Arts building in Roseburg. Mrs. Ned Dixon, department chairman, and Mrs. George Caskey, unit chairman, are there every Friday afternoon. Many hundreds of families are cared for through this department. The state department of the Auxiliary also keeps a hospital or rehabilitation chairman in Roseburg to aid veterans and their families. Mrs. Irvin Hoge has been chairman for several years, and during that time has visited every man in the Veterans Facility many times and has daily made their lives brighter by contact with some one who learns their problems and does something about it. Mrs. Riegel plans entertainment for the men, receives local papers, but other units which the library makes available. She helps provide material for occupational therapy, she oversees the making of poppies, she shops for materials not purchased by government orders, she writes letters for the men, but most of all, she contacts each man and brings a word of cheer. All this is a part of the program outlined by the rehabilitation committee, the conference of which Mrs. Riegel just attended. All western states and Alaska and Hawaii were represented. Mrs. J. H. Turnbull of Salem is Area E child welfare

chairman and presided at the meetings. The delegates were taken to Mexico and held one interesting meeting in an underground cave.

Mrs. Walter Fisher reports decided interest in the Americanism essay contest being conducted in the schools of the county. All essays are to be in Mrs. Fisher's hands by Feb. 29. Prizes amounting to \$15 are being offered on the topics, "Democracy, the Gateway to Peace," and in the upper grades and junior high, "I am glad I am an American." Mrs. Fisher wishes to thank teachers, librarians and principals for making it possible to bring the joys of American citizenship before these young persons. Mrs. Fisher also urged that churches be contacted to announce to their congregations the Slavery Day program for Monday.
