S. exports to Russia from September through December, shown by photo diagram, were mainly war materials and machinery essential to war industries. They amounted to more than half of the year's total (\$59,638,000). Miscellaneous metals sold include molybdenum, used to harden steel for guns; bronze, brass, aluminum. Machinery exported was largely for manufacture.
