

Hoop Tourney at Coos to Go On Air

Broadcasts by KRNR and KOOS Will be Sponsored by Safeway Stores.

Broadcast arrangements, which will bring to Douglas and Coos county radio listeners a play-by-play account of the district championship basketball games in which the Roseburg Indians participate Friday and Saturday, were completed here today.

The Roseburg Safeway stores have purchased broadcast rights for KRNR at Roseburg and KOOS at Marshfield and will sponsor the presentation of the game reports for the benefit of the fans unable to attend the tournament at North Bend.

The tournament will open Friday night. North Bend and Coquille are in a tie for second place and will determine their place in the tournament by a tie of the coin. The Roseburg Indians, holding first place in the league standings, will meet the third place team, as decided by the toss of the coin, while the second place team will meet Marshfield. The Indians will play the second game Friday night, starting, probably, about 8:30 p. m. KRNR, it is reported, will be informed of the result of the drawing between North Bend and Coquille as soon as teams are placed and will announce broadcast times to local fans.

Stores Appreciative
In the event Roseburg is successful in weathering the first round of the championship tournament, the championship game Saturday night also will be broadcast.

The Webfoots, trailing at the end of the first half last night 15-14, opened their real scoring drive in the second, led by their scoring ace and center, Dick, who launched the rally with a long shot from the sidelines in the first 20 seconds.

Harvie of Idaho was high scorer of the night with 21 points. Jackson and Townsend of Oregon each got 10 points.

The Whiskered Wizards of Texas, a House of David aggregation of talented and colorful basketball stars, will meet a team composed of local high school and college stars in an exhibition contest featuring showmanship and unusual ability to be played tonight at 8 o'clock on the senior high school gymnasium floor.

Hundreds of Dogs Killed in Douglas

Control Board Strict in Law Enforcement; Laggards as to Licenses Prosecuted.

A total of 452 dogs were killed during 1939 either by or through the Douglas County Dog Control board, it was announced today in a report made public by the directors. In addition to the dogs killed for various reasons, a great many stray dogs were placed with owners who are entrusted with training them and using them about their farms.

Approximately one half of the dogs destroyed during the year were homeless. Many were lost while the greater number had been abandoned by tourists or by persons moving from the county. One hundred and ninety-seven stray dogs picked up outside of the city limits were killed, while 150 strays were placed up inside the city of Roseburg and destroyed.

Eighty-three dogs were killed by owners or by the board in order to avoid payment of license. Fourteen were killed after being proved to be vicious killers. Sheep killing dogs destroyed number 127 and dogs killed after being caught slaying turkeys were two in number.
