Death resulted from a heart ailment, Coroner H. C. McKay reported. Unable to work yesterday because of the heavy rain, McKay announced about 8:20 a. m. that he was going fishing, the coroner said he was told. When he failed to return in the evening a search was made and his body was discovered a short distance from the house.

He was born at Nonpareil, Dec. 17, 1877, and had been a life-long resident of Douglas county. He was never married and has no near relatives. Graveside services will be held at 2 p. m. Saturday at the Fair Oaks cemetery. Arrangements are in charge of Stearns Mortuary, Oakland.

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WPA Rolls Will Stand for Present

WASHINGTON, Feb. 29.—(AP)—Colonel F. C. Harrington, work projects commissioner, assured a congressional delegation today that WPA would not decrease work relief rolls pending an appeal by the delegation to President Roosevelt for an emergency relief appropriation.

The delegation, headed by Representative Marcantonio (A. I. N.Y.), included Representatives Lester of California, Hill and Coffee, Washington; George of New York, Teague and Hook of Michigan, O'Connor of Montana and Keller and Fries of Illinois—all democrats.

Marcantonio said his group would ask Mr. Roosevelt to recommend to Congress an emergency appropriation to avoid a layoff of approximately 800,000 WPA workers during April, May and June. He declined to estimate the amount of the appropriation.

Harrington told the group that he had met the March enrollment quota at 2,318,000 compared with an average enrollment of 2,305,000 in February. This, he said, offered opportunity to increase rather than decrease WPA jobs during the next month.

The WPA was not a party to the proposed emergency appropriation, Harrington said.

Marcantonio declared that his group hoped to convince the president of the need of an emergency appropriation before WPA was forced to begin the drastic spring reduction to bring average enrollment for the fiscal year, ending July 1, to 2,000,000 a month.

Army Officer Will Seek Recruits Here

Staff Sergeant John T. Costello, commander of the United States army recruiting office at Eugene, will make a recruiting trip to Roseburg Friday, March 1, to interview young men of this vicinity interested in enlisting in the army.

He will be in the lobby of the post office building from 8:30 a. m. until 5 p. m.

Although the army has reached its authorized strength of 227,000 enlisted men the recruiting service is still accepting men as replacements for vacancies created by the normal turnover of personnel. Costello has vacancies for several Pacific coast posts and a few for Hawaii and the Philippines. There are several openings in army bands for qualified musicians.

Judge Brand Announces Candidacy for New Term

MARSHFIELD, Feb. 28.—Judge James T. Brand, who was one of the Oregon anti-picketing law last summer, announced Wednesday that he will be a candidate for reelection to a third term on the non-partisan ballot in the May primaries.

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Utilities Get Bid Under Holding Act

WASHINGTON, Feb. 29.—(AP)—The securities commission has begun a long-awaited move toward bringing major utility systems within the limitation of the 1935 holding company act.

The commission's first step, on orders made public last night, was to ask Electric Bond and Share company—the month's largest utility system—and Engineers Public Service company what each believed needed to be done to comply with the law.

Replies were called for by April 6 and public hearings were set tentatively for April 26. SEC officials pointed out, however, that the final action in integration proceedings might be delayed for years.

Electric Bond and Share controls about \$2,600,000,000 of assets in dozens of companies operating in 26 states and scattered from coast to coast. Engineers Public Service controls about \$775,000,000 of assets in a score of companies in 15 states.

The SEC announced that for the present it was confining its integration proceedings to the major systems, and listed seven others against which orders are being prepared.
