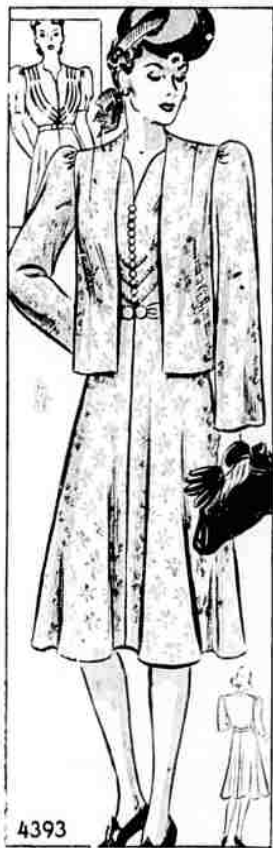
The club voted to sponsor a girls' tennis tournament this spring.

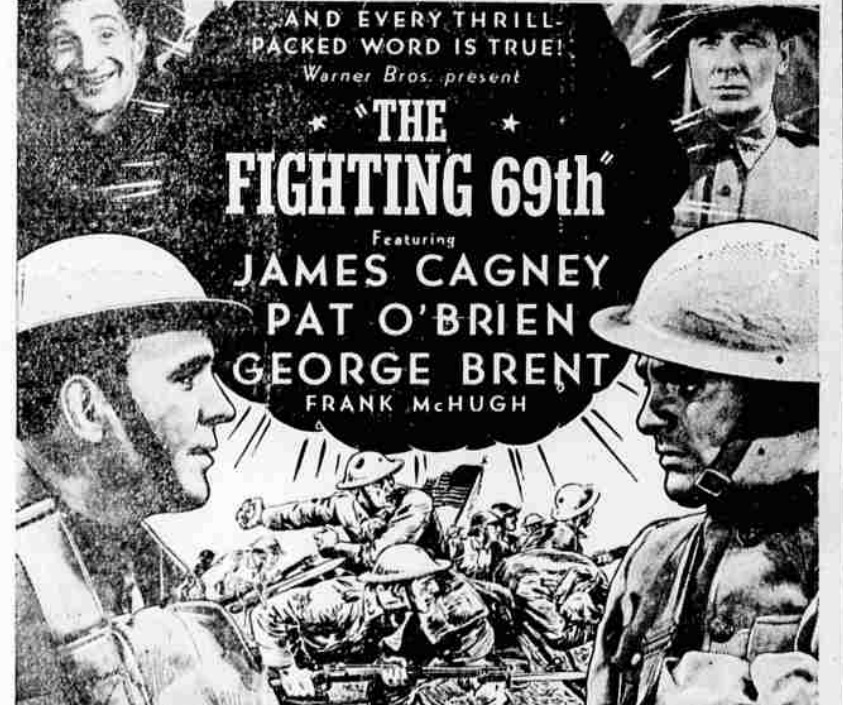
