Nazi Explain Why Neutral Ships Hit

BERLIN, March 6.—(AP)—General stiffening of Germany's treatment of neutral shipping was foreshadowed today in an official statement referring to foreign press assertions that German fliers were sinking neutral merchantmen without warning.

According to the statement German planes cannot discern from the air whether neutral vessels are being voluntarily convoyed or forcibly taken to British control stations for search. The mere fact of the convoy, the statement asserts, is sufficient for Germans to deal with such neutral vessels as hostile.

The German government, therefore, makes the enemy "entirely responsible" for Germany's having to regard such vessels as aiding and supporting the enemy.

The official further states that the German air force does not shoot at officers, crews or passengers on neutral vessels without cause.

The air force has orders to fire one shot across the bow of the ship, asking it either to stop, show its flag or make for a given port. If the ship declines to heed such requests, under international law—according to the German view—German airmen are entitled to take such measures as deemed necessary to enforce its orders.

Specifically referring to the sinking of Netherlands ships, authorized German sources said those vessels were all in convoys and when ordered to display lights tried to escape by blacking out.

These sources emphasized that Germany completely endorses Italy's stand regarding coal shipments, but declined to say what steps were next contemplated in this matter.

Nazi Atrocities in Poland Described

PARIS, March 5.—(AP)—The Polish emigre government, in an advance resume of data which it is to go into a "white book" tonight, accused the German conquerors of executing schoolboys, men and women en masse as part of a deliberate campaign to exterminate the native population of Poland.

The German government previously has denied Polish charges of mass executions in the occupied regions.

The official communique cited a long list of alleged atrocities and called them "worthy of the worst tyrants of antiquity."

Among the crimes the emigre government said had been committed were:

The shooting at Bydgoszcz of 136 Polish schoolboys, 82 and 13 years old.

"Massacre" at the same place in the end of December of 60,000 Polish men and women.

Evacuation from Gdynia of 250 Polish hostages and their execution, after they were forced to dig their own graves. Among those executed were listed the burgomaster, the mayor, the district judge, chief judge of the district court and the manager of the local bank of Poland branch.

Netherlands Sub-Boat, Rammed by Tugboat, Sinks

AMSTERDAM, March 6.—(AP)—The Netherlands submarine 9-11 was sunk in a collision with a tugboat in the North Sea today, but a daring rescue helped save all except two of the crew of about 30.

The submarine was cruising on the surface at the Denhelder naval harbor preparing to go to sea when rammed amidships by the tug Amsterdam.

About 10 men on deck sprang clear and swam to the seaward. Ten minutes later, a crowd gathered on the wall saw bubbles. Then the periscope appeared momentarily. After another 10 minutes, part of the stern emerged.

Two naval officers in a nearby rescue boat leaped aboard the stern and managed to pry open a hatch and help the imprisoned crew to safety.
