Wrecks Cause Mexico to Change Railroad Heads

MEXICO CITY, March 12.—(AP)—A new administrative council took over the management of Mexico's national railways today in line with President Cardenas' efforts to obtain more efficient operation of the 9,000-mile system he expropriated and turned over to the workers about two years ago.

Three wrecks in the last three weeks killed 19 persons, injured 60 and resulted in 500,000 pesos (about \$30,000) damage. This resulted in resignation of the seven-member council last night.
