

Army-Navy Medical Aides Are Sought

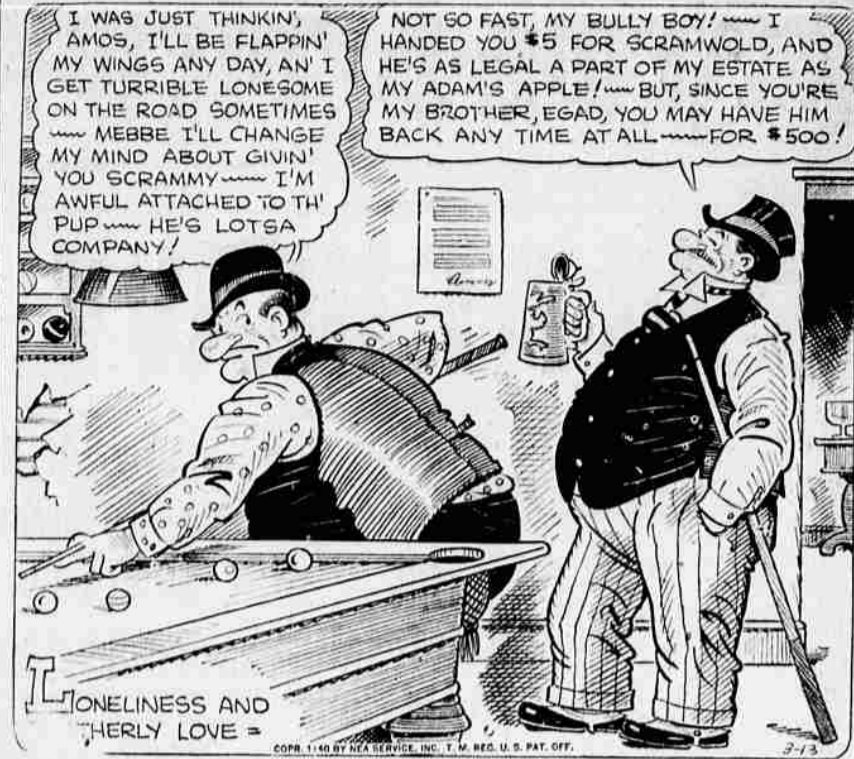
Mrs. Harry Hatfield, chairman of the Douglas County chapter of the American Red Cross, announces that at the request of the surgeon general of the army and in compliance with its policy of cooperation with both the army and the navy, the Red Cross, as an expansion of its peace-time service for the military forces, has undertaken the enrollment of various types of medical technologists who are willing to serve in the medical departments of the army and navy if and when their services are required at the time of a national emergency.

This plan has been under consideration for almost a year and has no relation to the present war situation in Europe. The enrollment now being inaugurated will be similar to that of the nurses reserve which the Red Cross has maintained for the army and navy since 1911, and which is now being expanded to include properly qualified male nurses, and also the reserve of dietitians which has been maintained since 1917.

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Judge Denounces Convicted Killer

NEW YORK, March 12.—(AP)—A judge whose voice broke with anger denounced as "a dirty bum" a 24-year-old Canadian boxer who had just been convicted of first-degree manslaughter in the fatal bludgeoning of Dr. Walter R. Engelberg, German consular attaché.

The jury, which had heard counsel for Ernest Kehler contend he beat Dr. Engelberg to death December 5 after the latter made immoral advances in his Brooklyn home, reached its verdict last night in six hours and 14 minutes.

It was midnight when the jurors filed into a courtroom emptied of spectators. Outside in the corridor Kehler's bride, soon to be a mother herself, wept with her mother, Mrs. O. A. Letts of Ottawa, Canada.

The boxer, who was caught in Toronto two weeks after the killing, stood frowning in defiance as County Judge Peter J. Brannan congratulated the jury for its "absolutely fair" verdict and then remarked bitterly:

"What in thunder made this man kill? Was it sex? I doubt it. He is just a cheap bum. Only two men in the world knew what really happened in that room, and one is dead. This man is lucky he was not convicted of a higher degree."

Kehler may receive up to 20 years in prison.

Missing Commission of John Paul Jones Found

WASHINGTON, March 12.—(AP)—The 163-year-old commission of John Paul Jones as a captain in the navy today after having been lost for nearly a century.

Captain H. A. Haldridge, curator of the naval academy museum, presented the relic of the revolutionary war sea hero in behalf of its owner, John L. Senior of Roseburg, Conn., who was unable to come here.

The document, slightly damaged from folding and unfolding, is dated October 10, 1776, and bears the signature of John Hancock, as president of the continental congress.

Doctors Vote No On Socialized Plan

MINNEAPOLIS, March 12.—(AP)—Twenty thousand American physicians, asked by the medical journal, Modern Medicine, whether they would cooperate with the government in a drastic socialized medicine plan, voted 88 per cent no. Modern Medicine, announcing the figures today, said it has no connection with the American Medical association. It declared that the voters included 2,600 doctors outside the A. M. A. and that these outsiders voted 79 per cent no.

The publication said this is the largest number of doctors yet canvassed on this social issue. American physicians total about 150,000 of whom about 110,000 are members of the A. M. A., through their county societies. The vote was by states, and the journal declared the doctors answering were representative of all ages and degrees of success.

The question read: "Would you cooperate with a federally administered and controlled legislative program tending toward drastic curtailment of private practice of medicine?"

Twenty-five percent of the 26,000 voted in favor of the A. M. A.'s recently adopted platform favoring local control of tax money spent for the indigent and for those who cannot afford doctor's bills.

Boundaries of Voting Precincts Are Changed

DAYS CREEK, March 12.—Information of considerable interest to those voters living in the territory between Days Creek and Milo was recently received from the office of the county clerk. The boundary line between Days Creek and Tiller precincts has been changed, sections 9, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 28, 29, 30, 31, 32 and 33 of township 36, range 3 west, sections 24, 25 and 36 in township 30, range 1 west and sections 4, 5, 6 and 9 in township 31, range 3 west, having been transferred into the Days Creek precinct. Roughly speaking this includes the territory from the Roy Matthews place up river to a point about one-quarter mile west of the Milo store. The people living in this territory who formerly have been voting at Tiller will now cast their ballots at Days Creek.

GRANTS PASS, March 12.—(AP)—George C. Sabin, 71, known to thousands as manager of the Oregon Caves resort company, died at a local hospital today. He had suffered a sudden heart attack Monday while driving.

Mr. Sabin is survived by his widow, Lulu Sabin, Grants Pass; a son, Lynn P. Sabin, of Portland, and a daughter, Marion Hopper of Chehalis, Wash. A nephew, Richard Sabin, Grants Pass, was for many years associated with him at the caves.

Moore, 95, is one of the few remaining civil war veterans in the Pacific northwest; Mrs. Moore is 89.
