

North Bend Loses To Salem Quintet

First Round Results at State Tourney Also See Lebanon Defeat University High.

SALEM, March 14.—(AP)—Survivors of the championship round drew second breath today to continue the annual four-day chase for the state interscholastic basketball title, the greatest prize of the prep school athletic year.

Astoria's tireless fishermen,

many times champions at the Willamette university tournament, and Salem's defending title, both favorites, set the pace in first round victories yesterday. The only contest carrying the flavor of an upset was Lebanon's comfortable win against strong University high of Eugene.

First round results:

Astoria 40, Oregon City 17; Baker 27, Klamath Falls 26; Salem 37, North Bend 34; Pendleton 26, Tillamook 22; Astoria 30, Chena-wa 22; Monroe 18, Helix 17; Butte Falls 30, Westport 28; Lebanon 42, University of Eugene 29.

Salem overcame a 5-point first half deficit in defeating a surprisingly strong North Bend team. Satter was the "big hertha" of Salem's attack, scoring 14 points.

The closely contested Baker-Klamath Falls game proved the day's thriller, with Art Williamson playing the hero role. With only five seconds remaining, Williamson stole the ball in mid court and sank a lay-in shot for Baker's winning two points.

Pendleton and Tillamook staged a see-saw affair until late in the third period when the round-up lads steadied and moved away. The halftime score was 18-18.

The deadly shooting of Jandreau, who chalked up 18 points for Ashland, was the feature of the Ashland-Chenawa encounter.

Lebanon's easy win over the highly respected University High was the day's big surprise. The underdog quintet grabbed the lead from the start behind the 16-point performance of Chet Simpson.

Monroe and Butte Falls, who will play for the B division championship, Monroe gained the second round of the championship bracket by defeating Helix, 19 to 17, and Butte Falls dropped Westport 30 to 28.

Fishermen's Union Sets 10-Year High on Prices

ASTORIA, Ore., March 13.—(AP)—The Fishermen's Protective union asked the highest prices in ten years today for Columbia river chinook salmon and steelhead.

Packers said the union sought 15 cents a pound for chinook from the opening of the season May 1 to August 1 and 10 cents from August 1 to the end of the summer fishing period. The average opening price for three years is 12 cents. Last year the price ranged from eight cents for the first 10 days to six cents for the rest of the season.

The union demanded 10 cents a pound for steelhead, four cents more than 1939, and five cents for Roe shad, an increase of two cents since last season.
