Clarence Allen Of Myrtle Creek Dies

Clarence D. Allen, 43, well-known resident of Myrtle Creek, died suddenly Monday evening near Astoria, Mr. Allen, who was employed as a bridge carpenter, was stricken with a heart attack as he returned to the construction camp at the close of work and died before medical help could arrive.

He was born at Wauhan, South Dakota, June 18, 1896, and moved to Portland, Oregon, from North Dakota about 1902. In 1911 he moved to Myrtle Creek, where he had made his home up to the time of his death.

He was married at Harrisburg, Oregon, in 1917, to Miss Mildred Taggart, daughter of Judge and Mrs. George A. Taggart of Myrtle Creek. Mrs. Allen passed away several years ago.

Mr. Allen was a member of the Methodist church and of the I. O. O. F. lodge at Myrtle Creek.

Surviving are a son and daughter, Richard Allen of Myrtle Point, Oregon, and Mrs. Virginia Edmundson of Alaska. He also leaves three brothers, Harry, Ray and Paul D. Allen, all of Myrtle Creek, and one grandchild.

Funeral services will be held in the Methodist church at Myrtle Creek Sunday afternoon at two o'clock. Rev. Mr. Bray officiating. Concluding services at the I. O. O. F. cemetery, where interment will take place, will be conducted by the I. O. O. F. lodge of Myrtle Creek. Funeral arrangements are in charge of the Douglas Funeral home.
