Vetch-Pea Dusting Dated at Yoncalla

A demonstration of dusting equipment for the control of aphids and pea weevil on vetch and Austrian winter field peas will be given at Yoncalla Friday, March 22, at 2 p. m., according to announcement by County Agent J. Roland Parker. The dusting equipment was recently developed by the agricultural engineering department of Oregon State college to combat aphid infestation on vetch and Austrian winter field peas and to control pea weevil, a serious pest in Austrian winter field peas.

With the increased acreage of vetch and Austrian winter field peas in connection with the agricultural conservation program it is expected that many farmers will want to see the dusting equipment and how it is operated. Tests indicate that vetch and pea fields can be dusted rapidly at a very low cost and excellent results secured in the control of aphid and pea weevil. Previous to demonstrating the duster a short program on the control of aphid and pea weevil will be given by the experiment workers in charge of the demonstration.
