Holy Week Rites Begun in Roseburg

Special Religious Services in Churches Mark Observance in Advance of Easter.

Special religious services, leading up to Easter observance, are being held this week in all of the city's principal churches. Today, Maundy Thursday, the day celebrating the institution of Holy Communion, is being given special observance, while Good Friday will be celebrated by union services together with special programs in some of the individual churches. Pre-Easter revival campaigns are being conducted in several of the evangelized churches and all are looking forward to particularly impressive services on Easter Sunday.

Holy Thursday services are being held today at St. Joseph's Catholic church and at the Roseburg Methodist church. At the Catholic church an all-day vigil before the Blessed Sacrament followed 7:30 a. m. Mass. A special service, commemorative of the day, will be held at 7:30 o'clock tonight.

At the Methodist church, Pastor Louis Magin will speak at 7:30 p. m. on the "Last Supper." Holy Communion will be administered at the foot of the illuminated cross.

Good Friday Services Churches affiliated with the Roseburg Ministerial association will sponsor a union Good Friday service, starting at 12 noon Friday in St. George's Episcopal church. The program will continue for three hours, the period of Christ's suffering on the cross. Ministers of the several churches will present the "Seven Words From the Cross" in talks of 20 minutes each. Worshipers are invited to come and go at will during the service.

A special Good Friday Communion service will be held at St. Paul's Lutheran church at 7:30 p. m. The service will include special music by the choir and a sermon by Pastor W. A. Sylvester on the topic, "Be Ye Reconciled to God." The congregation is inviting the general public to attend.

At St. Joseph's Catholic church, Good Friday Masses will be held at 7 a. m., 2:30 and 7:30 p. m.

At the First Baptist church services are being held each evening, featuring music by the Spiritual Jubilee Singers, a group of colored vocalists.

At the First Christian church a

one-week's evangelistic campaign is being conducted by the Rev. Walter Francis, with services each evening at 7:30 o'clock.

All churches are making preparations for large audiences on Easter Sunday when the Christian holidays will be observed by elaborate services. Easter music will be particularly featured in all programs.

Social Credit Govt. of Alberta Facing Voters

EDMONTON, Alberta, March 21.—(AP)—The Cooperative Commonwealth federation and a coalition of independents sought in today's election to oust Premier William Aberhart's social credit administration.

There were 145 candidates for the 57 seats in Alberta's ninth legislature.

The number of eligible voters is placed unofficially at 450,000. The social credit party which Aberhart led to victory in the 1935 general election has 56 candidates, the leadership independent group 57 and the C. C. F. 36. Candidates of nine other groups make up the remaining 14.
