Good Friday Finds Holy City Orderly

JERUSALEM, March 22.—(AP)—Pealing church bells and sunny weather invited thousands of Holy Land natives and pilgrims to worship today on the day of Christ's passion.

In the early hours of the morning Christians of many nationalities gathered at Pontius Pilate's court for a devotional procession along the Via Dolorosa, "the saddest street in the world."

With the war's concentration of thousands of British troops Holy Land disorders between Arabs and Jews have almost disappeared, and the air of dignity and orderliness here, where the Nazarene, burdened with the cross, walked to Calvary, was typical of all Palestine.

The ancient shrine church of the Holy Sepulchre was an animated scene of devotion, reflecting the abiding faith of Christianity in the permanence of the principles of Christ.

The khaki of British and Australian soldiers appeared amid the colorful robes of the Latin clergy.

Few civilians were permitted to enter the Church of the Holy Sepulchre this year because it is under repair, but the service there last night of its solemn splendor.

VATICAN CITY, March 22.—(AP)—In a special Good Friday mass in the Sistine chapel, Pope plus today stepped out of his slippers, knelt thrice, prayed and kissed the crucifix.

Thirteen chief cardinals went through a similar rite after Raphael Cardinal Bessi, camerlengo of the sacred college of cardinals, celebrated mass.

Myron C. Taylor, personal representative of President Roosevelt, was among the spectators of the diplomatic corps.

Ex-Land Bank Head Tells Why He Quits

WASHINGTON, March 22.—(AP)—Albert S. Goss told the house agriculture committee today that he resigned as federal land bank commissioner after his immediate superior suggested "Goss would be 'happier' if he quit."

Goss turned in his resignation to President Roosevelt last week, taking the occasion to criticize the Jones farm credit reorganization bill now before the committee.

The official who made the suggestion about his resigning, he said, was Dr. A. G. Black, farm credit administration governor who replaced F. F. Hill last December.

Some two months before his resignation, Goss said he had an afternoon-long conversation with Secretary of Agriculture Wallace at which the former commissioner said, he failed to win Wallace over to the idea that FCA should be administered by an independent board.

FCA, formerly an independent agency, was placed under Wallace last July 1 under a presidential reorganization order, Goss said that was a disappointment to him because he had been urging for six years that a board, made up of members with staggered terms extending beyond political administrations should run the agency.

He expressed belief that such a board would lessen the probability of abrupt policy changes.

Goss said his conference with Wallace broke up amicably and that the secretary expressed hope that Goss would continue his work.

Goss agreed with Rep. Andresen (R., Minn.) that Black had made the first move toward the commissioner's resignation, Goss added that he had thought of resigning several times before and that he was not "sure" about leaving the federal service.

Actress Alice Faye Gets Divorce From Tony Martin

LOS ANGELES, March 22.—(AP)—Alice Faye, vivacious blonde film actress, granted a divorce today from Tony Martin, handsome screen and radio crooner, on her testimony that he had been guilty of mental cruelty.

Martin told her she should have married somebody else—somebody "more settled," than himself, the actress told Superior Judge Samuel R. Blake.

Whenever she wanted him to be with her, she said, he would be some place else.

The couple was married Sept. 4, 1937, after an elopement to Yuma, Ariz., shortly after Martin had appeared in a minor role in Miss Faye's picture, "Sing, Baby, Sing."

Miss Faye said they separated last Jan. 8.

O. A. Snook Nominated to Be Postmaster at Drain

WASHINGTON, March 22.—(AP)—President Roosevelt today acted to nominate the nomination of Otis A. Snook to be postmaster at Drain.

PORTLAND, March 22.—(AP)—A \$16,174 out-patient clinic at the Shrine hospital for crippled children will be constructed by Harold B. Hammond of Portland, the low bidder.

Earl Riley, vice-chairman of the board of governors, said increased demand from northwest states and Alaska necessitated the addition. An additional 1,000 feet of floor space will be provided by remodeling.

No Sabotage Seen in Ship's Plight

BAITMORE, March 22.—(AP)—The federal bureau of marine inspection and navigation today scheduled a hearing for Tuesday in the mysterious flooding of the 235-foot cargo vessel Panamanian, while investigators inclined away from a sabotage theory after a preliminary survey of the damage.

The marine inspection bureau arranged to summon officers and crewmen for the hearing. An independent investigation was begun, meanwhile, by representatives of insurance underwriters, and harbor dockers started unloading cargo to lighten the ship.

The Panamanian had been scheduled to sail today with a general cargo for British ports. Less than 1,000 of the 15,000 tons of merchandise remained to be loaded when she suddenly began shipping water at her dock early yesterday morning.

Harbor officials and insurance company representatives expressed the belief that a slight list of the ship—perhaps when mooring lines were shifted—sent water cascading into the hull through a port-side fueling door in the ship's skin near the waterline.

Actual damage to the vessel was slight and agents for Arnold Bernstein, refugee German Jewish shipping veteran who now owns the Panamanian, said it would be ready next week for its dash through the combat area.

Valuable Dogs Killed by Poisoner at Days Creek

DAYS CREEK, March 22.—A dog poisoner has recently been active in the Days Creek vicinity, several owners having lost dogs. Among the most recent victims were two valuable dogs owned by Fritz Snyder. One, a pup recently purchased from Ward Cokerham of Oakland and partially trained for use in hunting turkeys, died about noon Saturday, while the other, a five-year-old white collie, also from the Cokerham farm and very valuable because of special

training for handling turkeys, died as the result of strychnine poisoning later the same day. Tablets containing the drug were found in the yard of the Snyder home and were evidently placed there during the absence of the family.
