Seemed Their Moment Nearer by the News-Review L. G. Int.

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SOME winecracker once remarked that if a fellow wants to catch a fish he must be a little bit smarter than the fish. The ordinary routine of the editorial office was routed this morning when the news room dropped on our desk a feature-service yarn (illustrated) about new types of fishing lure.

The story told mostly of bass plugs. For the benefit of the uninitiated, a bass plug is a piece of wood or metal about the size and shape of a small pickle with more barbed hooks in it than a rosebush has thorns. The game is to throw the plug where you think a fish may be, making it land on the water and move in a manner resembling some sort of animal appetizing to a fish. The appearance of the device would lead the novice to believe he is supposed to throw the thing at the fish and hit it. But that is not the way to use the gadget.

But we wonder from the point of this discussion which has to do with relative smartness of fish and fishermen. The new stuff on the market is to lure the angler, who in turn, will buy it to lure the fish.

Counters of sporting goods stores are groaning under the new stuff (and the regular stuff, too). But instead of the usual wooden and metal rigs, some of the modern junk is made from rubber, pyrexia, nylon and some synthetic material has been developed for leaders to replace the expensive work of the silkworm.

The feature writer mentioned above tells of a new departure in the art of tying artificial flies. They are now being tied backwards—that is, instead of the hook being put on in the conventional manner, they are attached to the bend of the hook and the two wings fly parallel to the hook shank point toward the eye of the hook.

The reason for this construction, they say, is that the back of the bend affords plenty of support for that heaviest part of the hook. The back also act as a small parachute and cause the fly to fall more lightly on the water surface.

Now comes a disturbing thought, the more disturbing because the writer of these lines is a buyer of the stuff referred to. The tackle makers make these flies, plugs, leaders, etc., to lure the angler. They have to figure out what will appeal to the fellow who buys, as well as to the fish. So it is a safe bet that the bright colors, the gaudy trimmings and the peculiar shapes and sizes of lures are really for the purpose of making this equipment attractive to the fisherman. No doubt the whole idea is lost on the poor fish which is supposedly color-blind anyhow.

However, if this editor can find some of those new fangled flies on the local market he is going to buy some. They MIGHT work.

one-class idea from the boats, and it has been as popular on land as on the water. In Europe, we often hear it said, only princes, the new rich and international confidence men ride first class. On a mixed train, the average American wants first class or nothing. Unless the need to travel is urgent, he'd rather stay at home than to ride tourist on a train where others are riding first class.

These one-class trains make it unnecessary to spend more than you really want to in order to be on equal footing with others. They are exceedingly popular, and have

been a great business stimulator for the railroads.

ON the railroads, particularly the Western lines, you can spend just about what you want to spend, starting with the low-cost coach fare, which doesn't include sleeper, and running on up through the one-class tourist trains, the mixed trains and the fast extra-fare streamliners.

You have a similar choice in Pullman accommodations, beginning with the modest tourist Pullman, in which you have a choice of a single berth or a section, and going up through the various classes of standard accommodations, including berth, section, roomette, compartment and drawing room.

American railroads are organized to provide the customer with about anything he may happen to want—much like American hotels.

If you're interested only in getting somewhere quickly, cheaply, comfortably and safely you'd better take the railroad. Because you lay all the cash on the counter at one time, it looks more expensive than auto travel but isn't in the long run.

If you want to come back with an expanded knowledge of the country you've passed through, you're buying an entirely different bill of goods in that event, you'll almost have to travel by car.
