EASTER SERVICES ARE HELD AT MYRTLE CREEK

MYRTLE CREEK, March 28.—The Easter Sunday service at the Myrtle Creek church was held at 10 o'clock, following a basket dinner. A sermon by Wayne Jensen, the evangelist from town, completed the service for the day which was enjoyed by a large number.

Following the services Pastor W. A. Barnes baptized seven boys. After church a short social fellowship hour was spent in honor of Evangelist and Mrs. Jensen.

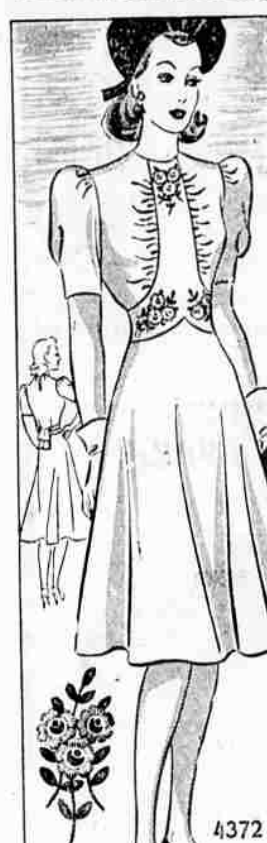
