

Louis Expected to K. O. Paychek Early

Few Concede Challenger Will Last More Than 5 Rounds; 1 to 8 Bets Favor Bomber.

NEW YORK, March 28.—(AP)—The morning's bench hung out the "S. R. 6-5" sign today as the first-class pugilist to heavy-weight champion bouts hit town loaded down with sympathy for Johnny Paychek in his golden shot at Joe Louis tomorrow night in Madison Square garden.

Experts, fight managers, promoters, fighters, hangers-on and just plain fans from all along flash boulevard were unanimous in their belief that Louis' tenth defense of the highest bauble in the science of scrambling ears means just another win for the Bomber.

One or two (count 'em) thought there was an off chance the Des Moines hopeful might last the 15-round route if he got by the first two rounds and could keep up his speed, the chief piece of artillery in his armament. But the rest were certain not even his prized fiddle and football helmet would keep Johnny away from Joe. The consensus was the Louis lullaby—plain and fancy sleep-making guaranteed—would rock-away Johnny sometime in the first five rounds.

Louis Shows Certainty.
"The 'big noise' of the flat-nose industry was so sure he already reserved space on the 11:45 (eastern standard time) train for Chicago tomorrow night. 'This would give him an hour and 45 minutes to dispose of the business at hand, dress, toss his toothbrush and his extra green suit into a bag, gobble a quick platter of fried chicken and make the train."

His corn-country clouting rival, however, wasn't so sure Joe would make connections. He remembered two rounds he boxed with the Bomber back in 1935 without suffering any severe pain, and he figured he was so far advanced now that he would do an athletic job of manhandling the champ himself this time.

1 to 8 on Louis.
"This wasn't what the boys and girls with a hoh or two to wager in the proceedings thought, however. It was still 1 to 8 on Louis would keep right on wearing the crown without missing his hair and 1 to 3 Paychek wouldn't leave under his own power."

Promoter Mike Jacobs figured there would be some 33,000 to 45,000 of the folks on hand and they'd kick in a gate in the neighborhood of \$75,000.

Relief Clients Are Denied Citizenship
WASHINGTON, March 27.—(AP)—The house immigration committee heard today that "some 200 applications" for citizenship by persons on relief had been held up by federal judges in three western states until applicants could prove they had received relief funds.

Representative Coffee (D-Wash.) told the committee this had been done in Washington, California and Colorado. In order to prevent the spread of the practice, he urged approval of his bill (H.R. 4221) which would prohibit denial of citizenship to any person because of his having received relief from a governmental agency.

Coffee said that 80 per cent of federal judges made no such requirement of citizenship applicants but suggested that congress should "do something" about the other 20 per cent.

Rep. Edelstein (D-N. Y.) submitted to the committee a letter from Edward J. Shanahan, deputy commissioner of immigration, reporting delay in some citizenship cases.

In the western district of Washington, he added, "the court does not deny petitions solely on the ground of relief but has continued a number" involving persons who had been on relief.

Mott to Ask More Funds for Willamette Project

WASHINGTON, March 28.—(AP)—Rep. Mott (R., Ore.) will appear before the house flood control committee next week to urge additional authorization for the Willamette valley flood control project.

The original authorization was for \$11,000,000 while the ultimate cost is set at about \$61,000,000. So far \$5,000,000 has been appropriated to get the project under way and Mott, who introduced the original bill, said he hoped to get the authorization and an additional appropriation.

Mott also appeared before the board of army engineers last week to urge approval of Chetco river project in Curry county, Ore. At the mouth of the river where there is a fishing settlement, sediment rapidly fills it up, making it impossible for fish to come into the river or boats to go in or out. The project contemplates the construction of a jetty which would end this.

Coast Clubs Held Better Balanced

Close Contest for Pennant is Foreseen by W. C. Tuttle, President of League.

LOS ANGELES, March 28.—(AP)—A confirmed optimist, President William C. Tuttle of the Pacific coast league is convinced the 1940 baseball season will find a better balanced campaign when the season gets under way Saturday.

Tuttle, in his annual just-before-the-battle statement, declared that the clubs are stronger this year than last, and added the belief it will require "at least two months" before it will be safe to even guess which clubs will finish in the first division.

"The president, who will go to San Diego to the Padre-Los Angeles opening game Saturday, said that Seattle, Los Angeles and San Diego apparently have replaced their player losses with good material, and Sacramento, in his opinion, was much stronger at this stage of the season than in 1939.

"San Francisco will have a hustling ball club, and Oakland has displayed enough ability in exhibition games to accord the team a chance."

"Portland," he said, "has a powerful aggregation, and if the pitchers come through, the Beavers will be a tough hurdle."

SAN FERNANDO, Calif., March 28.—(AP)—The Seattle Rainiers may be without the services of their ace first baseman, George Archie for their Pacific coast league opener against Hollywood Saturday.

Archie was hit on the back of the head by a fast pitch by Eddie Mike Hudnick yesterday and suffered a brain concussion. Manager Jack Lelivelt said the seriousness of the injury would not be definitely known until sometime today.

Spencer Harris, new Rainier utility man, took Archie's place on first.

Lelivelt announced the unconditional release of "Chief" Levi McCormack, Indian outfielder, who was with Spokane in the Western International league last year.

Russian Steamer Halted by British

LONDON, March 27.—(AP)—Reuters (British news agency) reported today the soviet steamer Vladimir Mayakovsky, said to be carrying a cargo of metals from the American Pacific coast to Vladivostok, had been detained at Hongkong pending examination of her cargo by British authorities.

The Reuters story, without date-line, said the vessel took aboard copper at Manzanillo and molybdenum at San Pedro, Calif. Both metals are used in munitions making.

In London it was stated that although Hongkong, British colony on the south China coast, had not been formally established as a contraband control base, a belligerent power had the right under the rules of warfare to bring in captures at sea to any of its ports for examination.

(The Vladimir Mayakovsky is the second Russian freighter taken into Hongkong. The 2,492-ton Selenka was compelled to enter there Jan. 13 and there has been no report of her departure in spite of protests by the Russian embassy at London against her detention.)

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College's Employment of Russell Rapped by Judge

WALLA WALLA, Wash., March 28.—(AP)—Superior Judge Timothy A. Paul of Walla Walla scored the employment of Bertrand Russell, English philosopher, as a teacher in New York City college in an address at the opening meeting last night of the annual three-day convention of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

"The standards of youth are being destroyed by so-called 'modern' academic freedom," he asserted. Judge Paul stressed the "tremendous advantages of the American democracy under its written constitution as against the tyrannical governments of totalitarian systems, where the leader's will is the law of the land."
