The new collections offer a plethora of ideas for the Easter outfit. You have the choice between the more or less classically tailored expression, and the dress and jacket ensemble. All are equally smart. It is merely a matter of personal suitability.

There are women who find more use for a dress and jacket than the skirt and jacket combination. The question of the blouse offers all sorts of objections for some while others revel in the fact that a set of blouses and a really good suit is all a woman needs to meet the first spring days.

Pockets Become Decorative

Creed's collection offers the most complete choice of both classical and non-classical clothes.

Suits show slightly longer jackets, well-fitted through the waistline, with or without collars and revers but stressing pockets as the decorative motif par excellence. Slit pockets, pouched or pleated pockets—in two's, three's and four's, often are underlined by braiding or piping. Sleeves are exceedingly simple.
