The one of the census taker would rather hear than any other is: "Won't you come in and have a chair?"

The census forms are pretty long, and matted together, they are heavy. It's a trick for a man to stand in a doorway and fill out the blank.

Oddly, the question on which the enumerator is drilled the most isn't asked very much. It is: "Will you show me your credentials?"

Census takers are instructed to answer promptly and politely and to produce the credentials.
