Arson Charged To Operator of Mill

J. W. Colvin, operator of a small mill located about eight miles east of Sutherlin, was charged here today with arson in a complaint signed by Maggie Gangrow of Sutherlin, Deputy Sheriff Cliff Thornton reported. County Judge Morris Bowker, acting in the absence of Justice of the Peace R. W. Masters, ordered that the case be held to the grand jury, but released Colvin without bail.

The complaint, Thornton said, charged that Colvin burned a building located on land leased by him from Mrs. Gangrow, one of the terms of the lease being that improvements on the land should become the property of the owner at the expiration of the lease.

Colvin told officers, the deputy sheriff reported, that Mrs. Gangrow objected to the location of the building in question, claiming it interfered with a cattle runway. He claimed that he removed doors, windows and all good lumber, with a view of reconstructing the building at a new location and burned only unwanted materials, Thornton reported.
