Science Advises Big Tummy Folk

CLEVELAND, April 2.—Men with big-window stomachs who are threatened with coronary thrombosis, the heart trouble that kills high-pressure mental workers, can stave off the disease by wearing elastic belts to hold up their "adiposities."

So likewise can certain other persons whose "middle-age spread" around the waist is sagging too much because of long years without proper exercise.

These discoveries, backed by numerous human cases, were described to the American college of physicians today by Dr. William J. Kerr, of San Francisco, past president of the college.

He gave the latest picture of this fatal disease, showing that it now can be recognized in early enough stages to take various successful preventive measures.

Coronary death is really suffocation of the heart. The "pump" fails to receive enough oxygen from the coronary arteries which feed its muscles.

The belt is useful in early stages. Its pressure raises the diaphragm, the sheet of muscle which divides chest from abdomen. The diaphragm moves up and down in breathing, helping to empty the lungs and then to refill them with fresh air.

In this movement it acts like a valve to draw more oxygen into the lungs and so into the blood. A sagging midsection results in a habitual lowering of the level of the diaphragm. Its swing up and down is less, with the net result that the heart gets less oxygen.

"Dietary measures and abdominal supports may add years to the life of an individual," said Dr. Kerr, "and during this time he may be symptom free if proper precautions are taken."

Meningitis Cure Found in New Drug

CLEVELAND, Apr. 3.—Evidence that meningitis, the brain inflammation which has been a long-time terror to both childhood and later years, is about to join the conquered diseases like typhoid fever, yellow fever, the plague and many others was presented to the American College of Physicians here today.

A series of clinics at the Cleveland city hospital showed the results of treatment of four kinds of meningitis, mostly with the new drug sulfanilamide.

One type was influential meningitis, rated until a short time ago as 100 per cent fatal. Hospital records showed seven of its last 13 cases were cured. The medicine was both sulfanilamide and sulfaerythine.

Another type is epidemic meningitis, formerly known as fall fever and flea-bite fever. Its death rate once ranged between 50 and 90 per cent. In the last three years the hospital has had 30 cases, not one fatal.

For this type the treatment was sulfanilamide and antitoxin, the substance produced when animals are inoculated with the poison from the disease.

A third type was the hemolytic streptococcus meningitis. In 1935 and 1936 the hospital had 11 cases, only one living. But in 1937 and 1938 only two of 11 died. The treatment for this type was sulfanilamide.

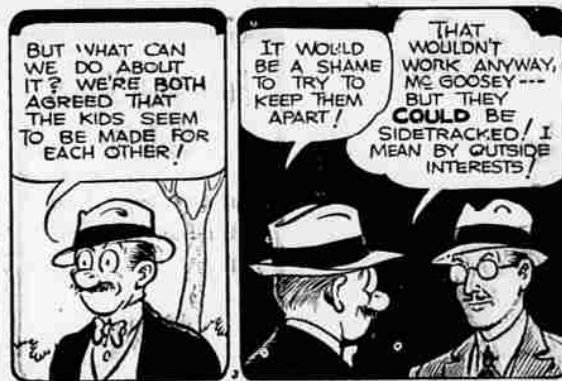
