New Uses for Old Drugs Developed

PORTLAND, April 5.—(AP)—Old drugs in new uses soon may save lives of persons afflicted with bone disease, blood stream diseases, meningitis, pneumonia and subacute bacterial endocarditis, a heart disease.

The drugs are neosarphenamine and sulfathiazol, Edwin E. Osgood, associate professor at the University of Oregon medical school, said at the annual convention of the Pacific Coast Surgical association today.

"We are not yet ready to report on the clinical end of our experiments," the national known researcher said. "Both drugs are poisonous and must be given in the right doses and at the right time. The administrator must watch continually for poisoning."

Dr. Osgood's year of experimentation has shown the drugs much more effective in the treatment of these infections than the more highly publicized sulfanilamide, he added. They also are considerably more potent than sulfapyridine or sulfamethyloxol, two other new drugs.

In a controlled experiment with five bottles of human cells, cultured from bone marrow and each having a bacteria count of 450,000, Dr. Osgood found:

"At the end of 24 hours, the bottle treated with sulfanilamide still had a bacteria count of 120,000,000; sulfapyridine treated cells had 1,500,000 bacteria; sulfamethyloxol had 120,000; sulfathiazol 34,000 and neosarphenamine but 61."

Socialist Leader Raps Capitalism

WASHINGTON, April 6.—(AP)—Public ownership and operation of essential industries to replace a capitalist profit system which "has developed a serious case of hardening of the arteries" was proposed by Maynard C. Krueger today in a keynote speech opening the socialist party's national convention.

Krueger, economic professor at the University of Chicago, spoke to about 20 delegates in the National Press club auditorium.

"We will get the kind of expansion which private enterprise fails to give us," he declared, "only by resort to public enterprise, which is the only possible alternative to the private profit system. A public enterprise can expand as far as the usefulness of its product justifies expansion, because it represents production for use, not production for profit."

Several hundred visitors also heard the address, which sounded the 1940 party battlecry: at the start of a three-day convention. A presidential ticket will be named and a platform adopted tomorrow.

Norman Thomas of New York is unopposed for a fourth successive presidential nomination.

Asserting the capitalist system had failed under Presidents Hoover and Roosevelt, Krueger said under either a republican or democratic administration the nation was "headed toward state capitalism, heavy on the armament side, light on the standard-of-living side."

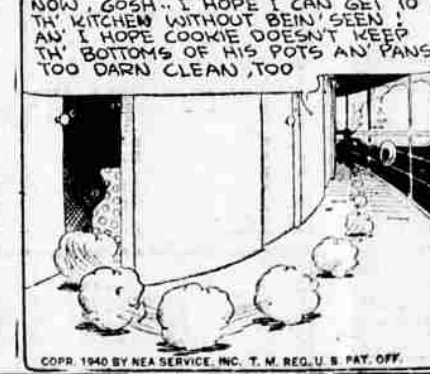
